Lockhart is making a fresh calculation of what we shall be able to call on and I doubt if he will be able to make it more than £150,000, so it is quite impossible to meet such things as a demand from the Treasury that we should pay back that five and a half million Loan.





The Revenue position continues to be satisfactory. Receipts from Customs Imports and Sundries for the five months reflect, for the first time this year, an increase over the corresponding period of 1936 while receipts from Excise duties continue to maintain an appreciably high level.

Over the five months under review Receipts from Licence Duties, Taxes etc., despite the abolition and modification of certain taxes, is considerably in excess of the corresponding period of 1936. A seasonal diminution in Native Hut and Poll Tax receipts has manifested itself and although revenue from this source for the five months shows an increase of £86.111 (excluding Kodi stamp receipts), actual receipts for the month of May showed a small comparative decrease.

In connection with the surplus for the month - £46,628 - it should be observed that receipts in connection with Colonial Development Fund Expenditure were £22,362 in excess of similar receipts in 1936.



The foregoing figures relate to gross receipts and gross disbursements. It will be observed that for the month of March, 1937, there is a deficit of £4,658 as compared with a surplus of £13,981 in the previous year. Revenue for the month exceeded that of the previous year by £6,404, while the increase in expenditure amounted to £24,044. In the revenue comparison allowance must be made for the absence in 1937 of Levy, Education Taxes and Graduated Poll Tax, while trade licences fees have been modified and petrol tax reduced. Further, under the head Reimbursements the Colony received a sum of £14,000 from the Imperial Government in March, 1936 on account of expenses of the Italo-Ethiopian situation. There was also a small comparative decrease in Customs Revenue which will be explained. On the expenditure side, apart from normal increases compatible with the estimates, the following items would appear to explain at once the expenditure increase and the working deficit for the month.

Latterly in 1936 transfers to Uganda were retarded in view of the proposed revision of Railway rates and the Kenya retention of duties was artificially increased. On resumption of normal traffic there was the expected reaction and Revenue for January 1937 was some £19,000 less than in 1936. During February enhanced collections practically overcame this difference, but in March, Kenya import receipts again failed to reach 1936 level owing to an exceptional and accelerated movement of goods to Uganda in execution of forward commitments related, most probably, to the upward trend in the price of trade goods. This feature may persist through April, but a reduction of such movement of goods is expected in May. The situation was to some extent anticipated and is not viewed with alarm. Collections for the combined Department are well maintained and shew an insistent increase over 1936; the collection for April is reported as being in excess of that of 1929, the peak year, by approximately £4,000 and there is reason to anticipate favourable Kenya allocations in future months.

Reimbursements - Decrease - £15,954.

Mainly due to the absence in 1937 of a sum of £14,000 which, in March, 1936, was paid by the Imperial Government in respect of expenditure related to the Italo-Ethiopian situation.

Licences, Duties, Taxes, etc. - Increase £75,529.

Analysis of this head reveals increases amounting to £112,495 offset by decreases amounting to £36,996. The greater part of the decrease is accounted for by taxation which has been repealed or modified since the first quarter of 1936, while the increase is derived mainly from collection of Native Hut and Poll Tax and the sale of Kodi stamps, the following figures being of interest :-

While these enhanced collections are doubtless due in some degree to increased collecting activities in the early part of the year, the figures particularly those relating to the sale of stamps, indicate also that more favourable conditions now prevail.

Revenue collections generally are satisfactory and up to estimates.

It will be seen that Revenue for the month of February, 1937 is £68,065 in excess of February 1936, when an actual deficit of £279 was recorded. For the first two months of 1937 revenue has exceeded that of the corresponding period of 1936 by £71,619, and while in this period most revenue heads reflect increased comparative collections this favourable result is in a greater degree due to considerably enhanced collections of Native Hut and Poll Tax. Compared with the first two months of 1936, Hut and Poll Tax collections for the current year reflect an increase of £43,664, including £7,153 on account of the sale of Kodi stamps. The net comparative increase in collections for January and February 1937 under the head "Licences, Duties, Taxes, etc." is £53,907. That this net increase is less than the increase under the sub-head "Native Hut and Poll Tax" may be attributed to the abolition of the Levy and the European and Asian Education Taxes; a reduction of 6 cents per gallon in petrol tax and a reduction of fee and extension of the date of payment under the Traders' Licensing Ordinance.

The modification of the traders' Licensin Ordinance, includin the three months' grace before proceedings for non-payment are instituted, has reduced collections under this head from £16,324 in January 1956 to £5,584 in January 1957. Abolition of the Education taxes previously due for payment on 30th April will be offset by collections under the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance also due for payment by 30th April, but a serious contraction in collections must be expected in June owing to abolition of the Graduated Poll Tax. On the other hand, collections in the latter part of the year will be improved by payments under the Income Tax Ordinance.

7. The improvement of £5,584 recorded in the revenue for January 1957, in comparison with the revenue for January, 1956, was not anticipated. It is mainly due to a large increase in the amount of Native Hut and Poll Tax collections.
