Requests Governor be asked to notify their agent of the date upon which the Ordinance will become operative.

Section 3 of Ord. 48 of 1924 provides that the Ordinance shall operate as a complete release and discharge of the Trustees i.e. the Africa Islands Mission Trust Ltd.

We ask that the commencement of the Order should be delayed until such time as the deed of transfer in respect of the Malanga Station has been executed. Messrs Goodman Brown & Co. now say that this has been done.

Details circumstances in which they regular approval for their clients to revert to the position which obtained immediately prior to passing of Special Resolution in 1923 and states that, if necessary, the writer would call at the Colonial Office to discuss the matter.

This letter is not free from obscurity. It would appear that the Trust Deed referred to in the last line of para 2, and in para 3, is the Deed whereby such hand-to-mouth arrangements as were made during or immediately after the war were regularised, in the particular case of Kenya, by putting all German interests into trust. Later this method of dealing with German property was generalised under Art 438 of the Treaty of Versailles, under the provisions of which were implemented in Kenya by the German Missions Ordinance 1924. Under this ordinance a new Trust Deed had to be made, which was done in 1926.

The special resolutions of the Africa Inland Mission of March 1923 cannot be traced, unfortunately, as the papers for 1922 & 1923 are being bound. But it would seem that these resolutions were made in order to bring the constitution of the AIM into line with the 1924 ordinance, the content of which was doubtless known already in 1923. That the resolutions had something to do with giving the S.P.S. some control over the personnel of the Mission is hinted in a minute of 1928 (Flagged); but this is little more than a guess.

Whatever the resolutions dealt with, it seems safe (?) to tell Goodman Brown that these resolutions may now be corrected, since all the business of the constitution of something German interest has now been brought to an end, leaving no necessity the AIM should not be free to go its own way. In the reference in No. 7 to the amendments  
made in the Articles of Association by the  
Resolution of 1923, Messrs. Goodman Brown and Co.  
referred only to the fact that these amendments  
were such as to give the Secretary of State certain  
powers of control over the affairs of the African  
Inland Mission Trust Limited. From the copy of the  
Resolution supplied with No. 9, however, it will be  
seen that the amendments went much further and  
contained the stipulation that "The Company should  
at all times be and remain a British Company under  
British control registered in Great Britain or a

British

British Colony, and having its principal place of business within H.M. Dominions, the Chairman and Managing Director (if any) and a majority of the other Directors .... shall at all times be British subjects, and neither the Company nor its undertakings shall at any time be or become directly or indirectly controlled or managed by foreigners or any foreign corporation."

As the 1922/23 papers, which would have shown why this stipulation was made, are not available, and as I was quite unaware whether the African Inland Mission Trust had any other interests (apart from the Leipzig Luthern Mission), which might have made it desirable to retain this provision in the Articles of Association, I asked Mr. Costley White to go further into the matter, and he has produced the note attached.

It is not very conclusive, but, on the whole, I see no particular reason for retaining this stipulation.



We have now had an opportunity of taking our clients' instructions upon the discussions which took place recently when we saw you at the Colonial Office.

X | We are instructed that there has never been any intention that this Company should be other than British, and if it will facilitate matters the directors are quite prepared for the Article 1(a) defining British Control to be retained, the other alterations and additions to the Articles, the subject matter of the said Resolution of the 12th April 1923, to be rescinded.

At the moment, upon a careful perusal of these other alterations, it seems to us that it may be somewhat difficult to retain Article 1(a) above referred to without reference being made to the subject of the British control in other Articles of the Company, and it would really be far simpler if the whole of the Resolution was rescinded.

We shall be glad if you will reconsider the matter in the light of this letter, and if the Secretary of State for the Colonies can see his way to this latter course being adopted our clients would be grateful. Alternatively, if for the reasons you gave us recently it is essential to retain the element of British control, if the matter is to be dealt with expeditiously, our clients will accept it, and upon receipt of your formal consent to the rescission of the remaining alterations comprised in the Resolution we will consider carefully the form of Resolution which must be proposed at the necessary Extraordinary General Meeting in order to carry out the proposal.

428 of the Treaty of Versailles. That Art laid  
down that ex-enemy missions should continue to be

appointed by Govt. In the case of the  
Leipzig Mission this was done by the

in X15637/29 Trust Deed of 1926, which had been in draft for two years at  
the time it was made. Already in

November 1926 the suggestion was made that the 1924 Ordinance  
should be withdrawn. Its machinery had been  
found cumbersome and the view was beginning to  
be generally held that ex-enemy property should be  
returned unconditionally to its original owners.

Discussion as to the procedure whereby the return of some but not all of the Leipzig Mission to be effected was prolonged, and was not accelerated by the Leipzig Mission's decision not to resume operations in EA. Instead it was deemed to enter into a friendly agreement with the ATM over the disposal of the property.

Whereby the

Ordinance of 26 July 1931 The 1924 Ordinance was repealed; it was thus still necessary to make provisions for the revocation of the Trust Deed of 1926 and the redispal of the property. In a friendly Agreement of Feb. 1932 between the Leipzig Mission and the ATM, it was agreed that the Trust Deed should be terminated, all the property should revert to the Leipzig Mission, and the Mulango Station immediately sold back to the ATM. To effect this the

Ordinance of 1934 was passed revoking the Trust Deed but providing that it should not take effect until a day determined by the Governor. This day was to be the day upon which the transfer of the Mulango Station by the Leipzig Mission to the ATM was completed. During to the change of regime in Germany there was much delay over the transfer, and it was not till February (1933) that a proclamation was issued in the Gazette Commemorating the Trust Deed by bringing the 1934 ordinance into effect.

A. When does the ATM want to cancel its Articles of Association and not establish the new Trust? See No. 1 in X150 1/2.

B. Does the ATM have dealings with other ex-enemy stations in EA, the affair of which might be affected by the action now intended?

I have been able to find no direct assurance to this effect that the Leipzig

C. Does the ATM have dealings outside EA which might be ~~affected~~ by the action now proposed? Again I have found no proof but (1) the fact that is written under B. above (2) its name (3) the fact that the Trust, we know, was formed to deal with the Leipzig mission (see skip above No 7 on X/5637/29) and (4) absence of any reference to other countries, especially in the note under the draft of 10/8/63/29, would all lead to the belief that there was or never had been any dealing by the ATM with other extraneous property.

D. Research done on X/5226/27 shows that 10 years ago the SFS was ready to aid the abolition of the Trust in Col. As the ATM want to keep the Trust going, for a perfectly sensible purpose, ~~but~~ the SFS need not, I think, be charged of fearing the Trust now from all controls he may have over it. Although there is no proof positive that this Leipzig Mission is all with which the ATM Trust was concerned, it is, I feel, rather straining at a gnat to

demand complete assurance in the absence of any indication at all that the ATM has ever had more than one iron in the fire. The action of the ATM throughout has been completely straightforward, and, although complicated, quite understandable.

However, if it is desired to make more certain about B & C above there will be no difficulty in having a talk with the ATM's solicitors. But I should have thought that unnecessary, and that ? the DSI may go forward.

We would refer you to the earlier correspondence which has passed between us relative to this Trust, and you will doubtless remember that the limitation to the effect to an agreement between the Africa Inland Mission Trust Ltd. and the Leipzig Lutheran Mission has now been passed in the form of an Ordinance, Kenya and Uganda C. of 1934, entitled "German Missions (Revest'n) Ordinance 1934", and brought into force early this year.

Following this the Leipzig Mission station had not been transferred by the Leipzig Lutheran Mission to our clients, and the ~~Trust Deed~~ of the ~~19th~~ September 1926 made between the Secretary of State of the one part and the Africa Inland Mission Trust Ltd. of the other part has now been revoked in pursuance of the ordinance above referred to, the purposes for which the Trust Deed was originally entered into having now come to an end.
