With reference to His Grace the Duke of Devonshire's despatch No. 1276 of the 26th August, 1928, I have the honour to recommend for your favourable consideration a claim for compensation received from Mr. A.S. Shah, a member of the clerical staff of the Forest Department, in respect of the loss of certain personal effects which took place in circumstances beyond his control.

(2) 1. About 5 a.m. on the morning of the 11th October, a fire broke out in the kitchen of the government quarters occupied by Mr. Shah at Londiani; the weather was hot and dry and the fire quickly spread to the house which was built of wood and cedar bark shingles. It was completely destroyed and with it the entire lot of the clerk's personal property. An investigation carried out by the local police authorities showed that the fire was accidental and that there was no evidence of negligence on Mr. Shah's part, and the Resident Magistrate, Kisumu, after perusal of the investigation file was of the opinion that no enquiry into the origin of the fire was necessary.

2. The detailed claim in respect of Sh. 319/- submitted by Mr. Shah has been scrutinized and I concur

with the Treasurer, who is of the opinion that compensation to the extent of Shs.249/- should be paid. It is considered that an Asian officer of Mr. Shah's standing could not reasonably have been expected to arrange privately for an insurance cover of his effects while in occupation of this wooden house; moreover, the arrangement by which European officers are enabled to insure their effects, details of which were conveyed in His Grace the Duke of Devonshire's despatch No.1390 of the 20th September, 1923, is not available to Asiatic officers. I am therefore of opinion that this claim is one which Government should properly meet as an act of grace and I should be glad to learn in due course that you will sanction the payment of Shs.2498/-, by special warrant, to Mr. Shah.

4. I take this opportunity of informing you that when the accident was first reported, it was represented to me that Mr. Shah, as a direct result, was in need of funds to provide himself with immediate necessities. I accordingly caused an advance of Shs.1,000/- to be made to him, recoverable in twelve monthly instalments, in respect of which in view of the terms of the Duke of Devonshire's despatch No.737 of the 30th May, 1923, I should be glad to receive your covering sanction.
