Mr.Wolfe, Deputy Director of Agriculture, Kenya, saw me last week about agricultural matters in Kenya. We discussed the improvements which were taking place in native agriculture and the progress (even if slow) of soil conservation works.

On personnel matters he referred to Mr. Burton - the Plant Breeder now head of the Coffee Team-and said that he felt that he was now ready for promotion to a Deputy Directorship should a vacancy. occur. He further said that there was a good deal of feeling amongst the older members of the Department who had been stagnating on the maximum salary of their scale (viz. £720) for some time. I gathered that steps had not been taken to bring them on to the new sclary scales or to extend their maximum up to 2040. I said that I was not in a position to say anything on this matter as I had no information us to how salary scule musters atood in respect of Kenye. Mr. wolfe said that something ought to be done fairly soun for those officers w had seen long service in Kenya and mentioned in particular Mr. wilkinson.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt 3 of your confidential despatch (2) of the 5th April on the subject of the arrangements for the selection of an Agricultural Officer to replace Mr. A.C. Maher.

2. I have no objection to the course proposed in paragraph 2 of your despatch, that the selected candidate should be appointed, on the usual terms, to the Colonial Agricultural Service as a probationer on the pensionable establishment, on the understanding that, if his services are not required in Kenya at the end of the suggested period of 5 years, the earliest possible opportunity would be taken to transfer bits to a scheduled post elsewhere within the Colonial Agricultural Service.

as an alternative to the selection of a probationer it might be possible to transfer both to this vacancy, and to the one vice ir. Bailey, an officer who is already a member of the Colonial Agricultural Service, & course which would involve the payment of an initial salary above the minimum.

Mr. M r's and ir. mailey's posts rave both been filled temmerarily by the engagement of local men, and in the circumstances I consider that a deta, of three months is not of sufficient importance to premant the extra expenditure which would be entailed by appointment by transfer in these cases.

I have the honour to asknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 48 of the 27th of January and to inform you that I approve of Mr. A. G. Bailey, Agricultural officer, being transferred, with effect from the lat of January, 1938 to the post of Education Officer, Education Department, for which provision has been made under Head IX, item 90, of the Estimates for 1938. I agree that he should enter the calary scale of his new appointment at 2750.

- S. As the Solonial Education Service will not be formed until the lat of June; 1938, Mr. Bailey will remain, for the present, a member of the Colonial Agricultural Service; but assuming that his new post will appear in the approved emecule of the Colonial Education Service, he will become a member of that Service on the lat of June, and his membership of the Colonial Agricultura' Service will then scase.
