I have the honour to state that, with the approval of the Colonial Office, we have received the sum of £100 from Major H.V. Landsberg on behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Hans Knopp who, we understand, are sailing by the s.s. "Timavo" from Trieste for Mombasa on the 21st September, en route to Kenya as Austrian emigrants (Passport No. 931794). The amount will be found credited in our September account. Major Landsberg has stated that under the emigration regulations Mr. and Mrs. Knopp will not be allowed to land in Kenya unless they have in their possession the sum of £50 each and difficulties may arise if he attempts to remit the amount direct to them owing to certain restrictions on the export of money from Italy.

We have to ask that the necessary arrangements may be made for the £100 to be paid to Mr. Knopp on arrival at Mombasa on production by him of the receipt for the money given by us to Major Landsberg (H.V. Landsberg Esq.). We have advised Major Landsberg for the information of Mr. and Mrs. Knopp that the amount is accepted by us without prejudice and that its acceptance does not in any way guarantee entry into Kenya of these emigrants.

15 I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No 417 of the 19th July, forwarding a letter, with enclosures, from the Passport Control Officer, Germany, covering an application by Siegmund Erdman, a stateless person, for a visa to enable him to proceed to Kenya and to take up employment with the Continental Furriers and Fur Storage Company in Nairobi.

2. The letter from the Continental Furriers and Fur Storage Company of Nairobi, intimating the intention to employ the applicant, appears to be of little value as a contract and contains no acceptance or obligation in the event of Erdman leaving that employment. The firm in question has recently been started by two German Jews, one of whom, Mr. I.M. Bendzel, arrived in Kenya in June 1937 and was admitted on a conditional permit, since cancelled. The other, Mr. Simonsohn, arrived from Germany in March, 1938, and was admitted on a cash deposit of £50, which is still held. The business concerned is believed to be the sole source of income of these two partners, and the scope of their operations makes it unlikely that it will provide a livelihood for a third European member or employee, i.e. Mr. Siegmund Erdman.

REMARKS

This applicant has just arrived in France coming from Hungary. He informs me that he formerly lived in Abyssinia and worked in conjunction with the two references given above. In Abyssinia, he was first of all a planter and later a bank clerk. Reference No.1 apparently arrived in Kenya in 1937 and is now employed as a clerk by a firm called TAWS LTD. Reference No.2, who is apparently a chauffeur and garage attendant, has been in Kenya since March last.

Applicant states that he did not apply for his visa for Kenya before leaving Hungary as he did not wish to reveal the fact that he had capital abroad. As a matter of fact, he is at present in possession of a sum of £91 in cash. He states that he could receive about the same amount from his two references and that friends in Hungary, who have capital deposited abroad, would also be willing to help him. His intention is to be a planter in Kenya.

As I am not sure that the local authorities want immigrants of this type with such problematical means of support, I am not prepared to grant a visa without your authority. Applicant states that if it is necessary for the Colonial Office to forward his application to the Government of Kenya he would like the references to be made by air mail at his expense.



May it please Your Majesty to read this letter of one who has very few rights to implore Your goodness not being even your subject. I am twenty years old of Jewish nationality, born in Wilno, Poland. My parents were rather well off, but were ruined by the times and finished up by the boycott. However I could achieve my college studies, the university was closed for me as Jew and so I left for Brussels when by aid of some relatives I could go on with medical studies for two years, that is to say until now. At present I am deprived of all help from parents and relatives and, not having the right to work in Belgium, I must cease them, though they were always my chosen ones. From the age of fourteen, I intended studying medicine and leaving as doctor for the tropics later. Now I cannot pursue my studies not only because I have no means, but also because I must help my mother, who needs help. I want not to return home, to Poland, because there I shall be only a burden on my family and no help. The intellectual Jewish youth is most touched by the political conditions there existing. Government, state and municipal situations are shut up. The same banks and other great undertakings. I may expect finding a job of a third-rate clerk with two pounds a month and no hope for better. The only way remaining is emigrating. I will emigrate to Kenya and thus in some measure satisfying my dreams. I do not regard Kenya as land where I could make money, and then, having made it, return to Europe, but as a home, as my country. I am seeking for freedom and bread. This I believe, Kenya can give me. Unquestionably for every emigrant has to deposit for a year the sum of fifty pounds on entering the colony. This sum I cannot afford. I dispose of a sum sufficient for the passage and three four months' living in Kenya. And this is the cause why I addressing myself to Your Majesty's benevolence to beg whether I could be freed of depositing the sum. This sum has to be paid to prevent from falling an emigrant as a burden on the colony of energy, cleverness, knowledge and education do still count, I state, I shall not be a burden. Never. I intend becoming a farmer. But after my arrival, I believe, I have chances to get a job of an office clerk or secretary on account of my knowledge of foreign languages. I know quite well French, German, and, of course English.

In the case of a foreigner's entering the British Empire, not only financial circumstances are considered, I believe. And therefore I may say that in my person the Empire will have as good a citizen as any. I have always believed that Englishmen are not taking an undeserved pride in their being born born English. English ideas, English history, I regarded always


as mine. The British Commonwealth of Nations I regard as the model humanity will organize itself after I had tried to enlist in the British Army when I had read that it needs soldiers. I have written to the British Embassy in Warsaw in Brussels to the War Office but of course the result was a negative one. I did not think for mere love of adventure for then I could easily enlist in the French Foreign Legion. Neither for money, because I imagined all the pay in all the letters I wrote.

I send this letter with one wish. May it reach Your Majesty's hands. It is difficult to express one's feelings on paper or even in speech. My whole life depends on Your Majesty's answer. But should it even be negative, please, do me this last favour and let me know.



It will be seen from the attached file of papers that Mr. Helmut Mendelsohn, a German national, has applied for a visa for Kenya Colony where he desires to settle and take up farming.

In 1934 Mr. Mendelsohn entered Palestine as an immigrant and remained for two years. He has stated that he found the climate of Palestine unsuitable.

Mr. Mendelsohn has also stated that he is in a position to produce evidence to show that he is in possession of capital to the extent of some thousands of pounds. He is already in touch with the Trade and Information Office for Kenya in London.

Subject to nothing detrimental being known in the United Kingdom regarding Mr. Mendelsohn's character would the Colonial Office have any objection to the grant of a visa for Kenya Colony?
