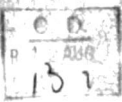

Sir,

In continuation of Kenya despatch No. 355 of April 9th under which was forwarded an advance copy of the Annual Trade Report for the year ending December 31st, 1925, I have the honour now to transmit six printed copies of the Report, six having already been sent under third personal note.

2. The Report generally reflects an advantageous trading condition in respect of the total area with which it is concerned. The balance of Trade is favourable, though it has to be observed that this is due to the preponderating exports of Uganda cotton. Notwithstanding the present adverse Kenya Trade balance - not excessive if the absence of manufactures and the immature development of the Colony is borne in mind - I feel that I am justified in regarding the list of this Colony's exports (p.33) as indicative of prosperity and promise. All the major industries of the Colony have improved strongly, in spite of unfavourable weather, in particular Maize, Coffee, Soda, Sisal, Hides, Wool and Sugar, while the heavy importations of machinery, implements, steel and non-ferrous metal manufactures, motor transport vehicles and their accessory fuels and oils promise further rapid -

rapid expansion. I am glad to observe that Bonded Stocks are not excessive. The increase of Bonded Warehouses is a satisfactory sign.

3. Both for Imports and Exports, the 5 yearly averages (p.16 & 30) are most encouraging: each has more than doubled the previous average, which themselves were more than 100% greater than the precedent records. The rate of increase in exports is much the faster. In this connection I have to observe that the 5 yearly average for the period 1921-1925 should be amended to £6,784,834.

4. The most notable events in connection with the Colony's trade during the year have been the Cession of Jubaland which has resulted in a heavy drop in the Ivory trade, the inception of a Customs Management Ordinance which will standardize practice here and in the Tanganyika Territory, and the institution of Maize Cleaning and Cold Storage Works at the Port of Kilindini, in which connection I invite your attention to the Commissioner of Customs' comment (p.31) on the remarkable development in the importance of this Port. Speedy extension of its facilities is undoubtedly called for. Mr. Walsh and his staff are, I consider to be greatly congratulated on their fine performance of duty during the year. It is much to their credit that the expenses of collection have increased relatively to the enlargement of the revenue in a proportion of less than 1 to 100 while the total cost percentage of revenue has again fallen (p.4). Their patient, sympathetic and painstaking fulfilment of their task is highly appreciated by all.

5. In respect of Imports, I am glad to observe that the Empire's share is not diminished. I desire to

Emphasize

underscore the large and rapidly increasing scope that Motor Cars, Lorries, Tractors and other machinery have before them in Kenya, and I hope most earnestly that British Manufacturers will devote their attention to the production of models suitable for local use. There is an immense field before them in Eastern Africa. The Economic and Finance Committee have been considering the possibilities of reducing the landed and up-country cost of fuel oils and I await their Report. I learn that in the course of their investigations the greatly extended use of agricultural power driven machinery and vehicles became evident, as did the great margin of land which by the use of such machinery - as opposed to animal drawn plant - can be put under cultivation with profit, given a reduction in working costs.

The effect of the progress of the soap making industry is notable as is the diminishing rates which cotton goods bear to the total of imports (vide p.15 and 11).

My only other comment upon Imports concerns the large quantities of food products imported into the two territories which can be produced locally, and I can assure you that the close attention of the Commissioner of Lands, Chief Native Commissioner and the Director of Agriculture will continue to be directed towards the stimulation of these industries. Rice, wheat, flour and Ghee are the products which I have chiefly in mind. I note the large value of Tea imported: as you are aware, this industry has recently been started in Kenya. At the present moment I am somewhat inclined to fear its future competition in the restricted labour market.

6. I take this opportunity of informing you that excellent rains have fallen during the last two months

1. INTRODUCTORY.

(a) A reference to the detailed statistics of Imports and Exports contained in the succeeding paragraphs and appendices will show that the hopes entertained in my previous report have been fully realised.

(b) The value of merchandise imported during 1925 amounted to £8,061,448 as compared with £7,790,7 in 1924, an increase of £270,741 or over 3% per cent. Exports of the domestic produce of Kenya and Uganda amounted to £7,821,844 as against £6,137,008 in 1924, an increase of over 25 per cent, and the net yield of Revenue collected by the Customs Department during the year under review amounted to £1,192,920 or £176,103 in excess of the net collections during 1924.

(c) Import trade during the year continued to progress along normal lines, the accumulation of stocks on hand at the close of 1924 being absorbed without any marked ill effect. Considerable benefit to importers and the country generally has resulted from the full advantage which is now being taken of the Bonded Warehouse system, as the periodical publication of details of stocks on hand in the various Bonded Warehouses tends to discourage overtrading and at the same time encourages importers to hold stocks of goods in the country for purposes of distribution or sale as opportunity offers.

(d) An encouraging feature in the statistical returns for 1925 is the very considerable advance in the value of industrial and agricultural machinery, implements, tractors, lorries, etc., imported, the extended use of which it is hoped will be reflected in due course in the Export Statistics of the territories.

(e) A shortage of rainfall adversely affected the yield of produce in certain areas as is shown by the figures relative to value and value Exports, but despite this fact a notable advance in the total value of exported produce has taken place.

(f) As regards the future, the recent fall in the price of cotton and the possibility that the somewhat unfavourable climatic conditions of last season may affect Imports and Exports during 1926 tend to indicate that some measure of caution is necessary when estimating trade prospects in the immediate future, but the effect of railway and road extensions and the largely increased area under cultivation have not yet been fully realised and it is not improbable that in normal circumstances some further advance in the total overseas trade of the territories may result in 1926.

2. CUSTOMS LAW AND PROCEDURE.

(a) Under the Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925, certain relatively unimportant additions to the "free" list were made whilst the Customs (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925, provided for a relaxation of the Regulations governing the admission of trade samples and the allowance for wastage of oils and other liquids imported in bulk and entered for warehousing.

(b) In March, 1925, a Conference, under the Chairmanship of H. H. Trade Commissioner, met at Dar-es-Salaam with the object of securing the closest possible co-ordination in regard to Customs Laws and procedure in the three territories of Kenya, Uganda, and Tanganyika. Very considerable progress towards this end was made and a draft Customs Management Ordinance suitable for enactment in the three Dependencies has since been agreed upon; the Zanzibar Government also participating in these efforts towards co-ordination. By the institution in due course of virtually identical Customs Management legislation, Regulations, forms and documents, it is hoped that business in and with British Eastern Africa will be greatly facilitated.

(c) Consequent upon the cession of Jubaland to Italy, the Customs Stations at Kisumu, Gohwan and Yambi were closed on 29th June, 1925, the Province thenceforward being treated as foreign territory for Customs purposes. The seaborne trade of Jubaland in 1924 amounted in value to £126,787, of which £50,989 represented trade with other parts of Kenya and 69,778 with foreign countries. Customs Duty collections amounted to 26,203.

By the transfer of this territory statistics relating to foreign trade are somewhat increased, customs duties showing a corresponding contraction, and some diminution in the total amount of duty collected results, although the net loss of Revenue is small owing to the fact that goods imported from Jubaland are now chargeable with duty on introduction into Kenya.

(d) The estimated revenue for the year was £1,000,000 or £145,000 in excess of the amount estimated for 1924, but, as shown above, the actual Revenue amounted to £1,192,920 or £192,920 over the original estimate which was framed in 1924 at a time when it was necessary to estimate on the conservative side having regard to the heavy stocks held in bond and on the open markets of both territories.

(b) As compared with 1924, the expenditure shows an increase of £1,734 against an increase in Revenue of £176,103.

(c) During the year, the total cost of collection of the Customs Revenue represented 8.02 per cent. of the net receipts as compared with 8.29 per cent. in 1924 and 10.30 per cent. for the year ended 31st March, 1914, while the total expenditure represented 2.98 per cent. of the net total amount collected by the Department, reflecting the continued practice of the most rigid Departmental economy.

(d) The continued demand for up-to-date and exhaustive trade statistics has, to a great extent, been met but, as pointed out in my previous report, if efficiency is to be maintained, the Customs staff should be augmented more or less proportionately to the amount of traffic handled as, unless this principle is accepted, it is impossible to continue to cope with a steadily increasing volume of trade and at the same time meet the legitimate requirements of the trading community in regard to warehousing facilities, statistical information and the like.

6. GENERAL IMPORTS.

(a) The import trade of Kenya and Uganda is classified under the following headings:

- (1) Total Imports (i.e., goods cleared direct and goods entered for warehousing).
- (2) Imports for Home Consumption (i.e., goods cleared from Customs Control on landing and also goods cleared from bonded stocks).
- (3) Imports on Government Account.
- (4) Imports of goods in Transit.
- (5) Imports of goods in Transhipment.

(b) For statistical purposes, Imports are valued as they lie at the port of entry, plus landing charges; such value include trade and cash discounts but include freight, insurance, and the value of the packages containing such goods, together with any commission paid.

(c) Since the 1st of January, 1922, goods, the produce or manufacture of Tanganyika Territory, are admitted into Kenya and Uganda free of duty and, therefore, such items, although mainly intended for ultimate export via Kilindi, appear in the 'Import' (and when exported, in the 'Re-export') Tables under their respective statistical headings.

7. TRADE IMPORTS.

(a) All trade imports for Home consumption are included under this heading, also articles liable to duty imported as passengers' baggage.

(b) It is impossible to ascertain, at the time of importation, whether goods, imported and duty paid, are finally for Home consumption or for subsequent re-exportation, therefore the tables of merchandise include all goods landed and duty paid, if subject to duty, other than goods declared in transit and transhipment.

(c) Goods entered for warehousing and not delivered from bond are included only in the figures of total imports; goods cleared ex Bond appear in the Home consumption or re-export tables as the case may be.

8. DUTIABLE AND NON-DUTIABLE MERCHANDISE.

(b) The increase in the value of non-dutiable goods imported during 1925 is mainly accounted for by increased importations of Industrial and Agricultural Machinery together with increased imports of goods, the produce or manufacture of Tanganyika Territory (see para. 6a).

9. PRINCIPAL ARTICLES OF TRADE IMPORTS.

(a) The principal trade imports are dealt with under the different classes enumerated in the Official Import and Export List. Full details are given in the statement of Imports (Table III, Appendix).

(b) Class I. Food, Drink, and Tobacco.

Imports under this class are valued at £1,394,684 or 17 per cent. of the total Trade Imports during the year under review, as compared with £1,058,880 or 16 per cent. of the total trade imports in 1924.

The following items call for special note—

(1) SPIRITS, WINES, ALE AND BEER.

This classification represents a total value of £143,462 or 1.7 per cent. of the total trade imports. During the last three years imports were

The whole quantity originated in Great Britain. Wines take the second place in value and the third in quantity. The average declared value per gallon was 12s. 16d. as against 11s. 2d. in 1924 and 10s. 4d. in 1923.

France, Italy, Portugal, Spain and Great Britain were the principal countries of origin. The increased importations of this commodity is undoubtedly attributable to the alteration in the basis of assessment of duty as from 1st January, 1924.

Ale, Beer, and Stout, etc., take the third place in value and the first in quantity. The average declared value works out at 5s. 8d. per gallon from Great Britain; 4s. 2d. from Germany; 4s. 1d. from South Africa and 3s. 11½d. from Holland.

Germany leads with 66.6 per cent. of the quantity imported. Great Britain is second with 15 per cent. and The Union of South Africa third with 10 per cent. The Balance originated in Holland, Denmark, Norway and The United States of America.

Great Britain's proportion of this trade has increased from 9.6 per cent. while that of Germany has dropped from 69 per cent. in 1924.

Local activities in the production of beer do not yet show any marked effect on importation. Brandy is fourth in order of quantity and value. The average declared value per "proof" gallon was 15s. 6d. as against 19s. 6d. in 1924 and 23s. 1d. in 1923. With the exception of 19 gallons from Germany and Portugal, the whole quantity originated in France.

Gin and Geneva show an average value of 15s. 6d. per "proof" gallon as against 15s. 5d. in 1924 and 23s. 1d. in 1923.

Great Britain supplied 94 per cent. of this commodity, the balance originating in Holland. Liqueurs originated principally in France and Great Britain while Rum was mainly imported from different parts of the British Empire.

India supplied 59 per cent. and the balance came from Tanganyika Territory.

Wheatmeal and flour occupy the second place and represent 25 per cent. of the value and 24 per cent. of the quantity of grain and flour imports.

With the exception of a small consignment of 3 cwt., the whole quantity originated in India.

As mentioned in my previous report, the growing demand for this commodity is reflected in the increased imports, notwithstanding the expansion in the local flour milling industry. Weather and crop conditions being favourable a promising future for local wheat producers and millers is assured.

Of the total importations of Cotton Piece Goods valued at £1,604,501, imports by Uganda during 1925 were valued at 204,200 or 12 per cent of the total imports of Kenya and Uganda, and it is estimated that fully 75 per cent of these imports is supplied by the Native populations of both territories.

The Cotton Piece Goods market is, naturally, an increasingly volatile one, but in comparison with the total trade imports its relative importance continues to diminish the proportion during 1925 being 20 per cent as against 23 per cent in 1924 and 30 per cent in 1923. Unbleached Piece Goods show a marked increase in the quantity and value imported the reason being that, as a direct consequence of the rapid development of the territories, the native population is now purchasing goods of a wider range and better quality than was the case when grey sheeting constituted the main article of imports.

As regards the countries of origin of imported Cotton Piece Goods of all classes, it will be seen that there has been a falling off in the value of goods originating in the United Kingdom, India and Burmah and Japan, whereas Holland, and to a less extent Germany, have increased their trade in this market.

From the above figures it will be seen that imports under this head are more than three times greater than the combined imports of 1923 and 1924. This abnormal increase in imports is directly due to the rapid development of mechanical transport for the conveyance of produce, etc., and the extension of mechanical ploughing, etc., where large areas are under cultivation.

Uganda imported during 1925, 346 Motor Cycles, Sidecars and Tricars valued at £24,398.

An increase in the numbers imported has to be recorded but the average value decreased from £48.50 in 1924 to £44.94 in 1925.

Great Britain continues to be the principal source of supply with 94 per cent. of the total quantity imported.

(2f) MOTOR CYCLE, SIDECAR AND TRICAR PARTS AND ACCESSORIES

Imports are valued at £10,635, Great Britain being the main source of supply.

(2g) BICYCLES

This important item of Native Trade continues to increase and details are given showing imports during the last three years:—

The increased imports are due to the demand for bicycles by the Natives of both territories.

As will be seen from the above figures, Great Britain continues to be the main source of supply.

(2h) Other items imported under the classification of vehicles include an aeroplane from Great Britain.

This item appears on the list of Imports for the first time.

(3) Oils, Fats and Resin Manufactures.

Imports under this group amounted to £531,944 or 6 per cent. of the total trade imports as against £390,916 or 6 per cent. in 1925.

Details are given below showing imports of the principal items.

(3a) PETROLEUM.

This forms the item of first importance in the group and includes:—Motor Spirit, Fuel Oil, and Mineral Oil (illuminating or burning). The total value amounted to £366,400 or 4.5% of the total trade imports.

The increase in Petrol and Kerosene Oil would seem to follow as a result of the greatly increased importations of Motor Cars, Lorries and Tractors.

Imports of Petrol from America amounted to 32 per cent. of the total quantity imported, compared with 34 per cent. in 1924 and 17 per cent. in 1925, while the supplies of Kerosene Oil from that country were 36 per cent. during the year under review; 27 per cent. in 1924 and 32 per cent. in 1925.

A considerable proportion of the fuel oil imported is subsequently re-exported as fuel for vessels using Kilindini Harbour.

(3b) LUBRICATING OIL AND GREASES.

Prior to 1925 these were classified under one heading, but owing to the development and growing importance of this trade separate figures have been extracted and full details of imports will be found in Table III (appendix).

Lubricating Greases.—Supplies were obtained mainly from The United States of America and Great Britain.

(3c) COMMON SOAP.

The value of common soap imported during the year was £61,624 as against £64,437 in 1924.

70 per cent. of the quantity was supplied by Great Britain; 20 per cent. by Tanganyika Territory and 8 per cent. by Zanzibar.

The decrease in Imports of this commodity is directly attributable to the development of local activities in the manufacture of Soap.

(3d) TOILET SOAP.

In addition to common soap, imports of Toilet Soap amounted to £18,579 as compared with £21,606 in 1924.

Great Britain and Germany were the principal countries of origin.

(4) MACHINERY.

The value of imports under this group amounted to £382,287 or 4.7 per cent. of the total trade imports, compared with £294,863 or 4.6 per cent. in 1924.

INDUSTRIAL MACHINERY AND PARTS.—The principal items of this group were valued at £235,900 or 62 per cent. of the total machinery imports.

AGRICULTURAL MACHINERY AND PARTS.—Represent a value of £70,763 or 18 per cent. of the machinery imports.

A continued increase in the importations of Steam Engines (all for industrial purposes) fails to be recorded.

Uganda's imports valued at £196,376 or 51 per cent. of the total Imports of Machinery during 1925.

(5) JUTE BAGS AND SACKS.

Excepting bags and sacks to the value of £1,981, all the 1925 imports were supplied by India.

Having regard to the favourable local facilities for the cultivation of suitable fibres, together with the continued increase in the demand for bagging and sacking for use in connection with the packing of export produce, I would again remark that there would appear to be no insuperable difficulty in the way of profitable manufacture of bags and sacks in the country.

Uganda's imports were 26,423 dozens, weighing 23,713 cwts, valued at £62,480 or 27 per cent. of the total imports of Bags and Sacks.

Imports through the medium of the Parcel Post amounted to £343,357 or 4 per cent. of the total trade imports, compared with £263,656 or 4 per cent. in 1924.

73 per cent. originated in Great Britain and 13 per cent. in India.

Uganda's proportion of the Post Parcel trade was valued at £94,658 or 31 per cent. of the total for Kenya and Uganda.

Customs duty on Post Parcels is assessed by the Customs Department and collected by the Postal authorities. The amount accruing from this source during the year under review was £65,403 as compared with £50,703 in 1924.

12. RE-EXPORTS.

This heading includes all imported goods (other than goods declared in Transit and Transhipment) which are subsequently re-exported to a foreign destination. As indicated at para 9(a) under "General Imports" the produce of Tanganyika Territory passing through Kenya and Uganda for shipment from Mombasa or Kilindini appears in the list of re-exports. The value of this traffic in 1925 amounted to £838,581 (as against £544,493 in 1924 and £434,193 in 1923) thus accounting for the large increase in the value of goods re-exported.

(a) The entrepot trade of Mombasa continues to be of considerable and growing importance, large stocks of all varieties of goods being held either in bond or duty paid, for sale in the markets of Zanzibar, Tanganyika Territory Italian East Africa and the Belgian Congo.

(c) In the case of duty paid goods subsequently re-exported, in original packages, full drawback is allowed under certain conditions.

Imports under this heading amounted to £165,767 during the year under review and £182,400 during 1924.

16. WAREHOUSED GOODS.

In addition to the Government Warehouses at Mombasa, Nairobi and Kampala, 28 private bonded warehouses were licensed during the year. Of these, number 17 are situated at Mombasa, 4 at Nairobi, 1 at Kisumu and 1 at Jinja.

(b) A very marked extension of the use to which the Bonded Warehouse System is put has to be recorded. To meet the demand for Bonded Warehouse accommodation, Jinja and Kisumu were approved as Warehousing ports; six additional Warehouses at Mombasa and four at Nairobi being licensed during the year under review.

(c) The value of goods remaining in bond at the close of the year amounted to £478,165 as compared with £240,404 on 31/12/1924.

(c) Apart from the abnormal years of 1919 to 1920 and 1920 to 1921, when prices were exceptionally high and currency fluctuated to some extent, the above table reflects a remarkably steady advance in the development of these territories.

During the period under review, the principal increase is in respect of cotton, which shows an advance in value of £1,205,610, compared with exports during 1924; other very satisfactory items being Coffee, Sisal, Hides and Skins, Soda, and Malze, together showing a further increase of some £475,000 over 1924 exports.

MAIZE comprises the chief item of the above statement and represents 6 per cent. of the total domestic exports.

The principal countries of consignment were:—Great Britain 41 per cent.; Holland 17 per cent.; Italian East Africa 16 per cent. and Belgium 13 per cent.

The whole quantity of Maize exported originated in Kenya. The importance of the Maize growing industry is eloquently illustrated in the above figures and the result for the current year is the more satisfactory when due consideration is given to the unfavourable weather conditions prevalent through out the Highlands of Kenya during the year.

RICE. I would again invite particular attention to the position regarding this commodity. A reference to the Import Tables will show that a quantity amounting to 147,505 cwts., valued at £150,315 was imported during the year under review of which 59,998 cwts. worth £65,199 originated in Tanganyika Territory. With so valuable a local market, it would certainly appear that special efforts should be made to promote the growing of rice in suitable areas.

MAIZE MEAL. A notable advance in the quantity of maize meal exported has to be recorded. The principal country of consignment was Tanganyika Territory.

(3) SUGAR

Domestic exports under this head including jaggery, amounted to 9,951 cwts., valued at £17,300. Refined sugar amounted to 9,324 cwts., valued at £16,858 of which 8,341 cwts., valued at £15,051 went to Tanganyika Territory.

The following items of note are dealt with in their order of importance:—

(1) COTTON.

This individual item heads the list of the combined exports of Kenya and Uganda, with a value of £4,604,359 or 60 per cent. of the total domestic exports, as against £3,489,320 or 56.8 per cent. in 1924. As indicated in my previous report there has been a considerable increase in the output of cotton from Uganda.

The origin of the cotton exported during 1925 is shown on the Export Return to be: Uganda 784,153 cents, and Kenya 1,590 cents, but the latter figure represents exports only of Kenya Coast-grown Cotton, while a further quantity of 2,140 cents grown in Nyanza Province was exported via Mwanj and at the time of exportation, this was declared as Ugandan Produce.

Of the total exports 51 per cent. were consigned to Great Britain and 40 per cent. to India, but, as previously indicated, it is possible that a considerable proportion of the cotton shipped to the Banker's Market was subsequently re-exported for consumption in Japan or Great Britain.

The great bulk of imports and exports pass through Mombasa and the remarkable development in the importance of the Port is clearly illustrated by the above table which shows the value of trade to have increased by 8,766 per cent. in thirty-one years or 456 per cent. since the pre-war period ended 31st March, 1914.

23. DISTRIBUTION OF FOREIGN TRADE BETWEEN KENYA AND UGANDA.

Kenya and Uganda are one administration unit for purposes of Customs and complete freedom of trade exists between the two territories.

(b) The removal of all Customs barriers in 1917 has unquestionably been of very great value as a means of fostering trade for the reason that traffic between Kenya and Uganda now passes without the restrictions previously enforced, but by their removal the comparatively minor difficulty of ascertaining the respective trade of the two territories has been largely increased.

(c) Having regard to the fact that the allocation of Customs Revenue is based on the actual consumption of dutiable goods in each territory the greatest possible care is taken to ascertain the quantity and value of goods imported through Kenya for consumption in Uganda by the abstraction of particulars from the manifests of vessels trading on Lake Victoria and other particulars obtained in regard to overland traffic leaving via Nairobi and Kisumu; to these figures being added the small quantity of goods imported for local consumption, across the Tanganyika Territory and Congo Frontiers.

(2) EXPORTS

As regards the country of origin of exports a similar difficulty presents itself but this has, to a great extent, been overcome by requiring Shippers to include on all export entries particulars of the Country of Origin of the goods they desire to export.

By this means a close approximation of the actual export trade of the two territories is arrived at but no account is taken of local produce exported from one of the territories for consumption in the other and in the case of certain commodities, such as hides, which are ordinarily imported from Uganda for grading and baling together with Kenya and Tanganyika Territory hides prior to shipment, a margin for unavoidable errors in declarations must be allowed:—
