On veterinary research, Sir E. Grigg hoped that it sould be passible without waiting for closer union, to accept the services of Sir A. Theiler to advise on how the veterinary research in E.Africa should be organised. He hoped that a despatch may be cent to the four places Kenya, ligands, Zanzibar, Tanganyika, teiling them to co-operate in obtaining Sir A. Theiler's services, the cost being borns in equal shares.

On native welfare research, the report of the Sub-Committee of the Civil Research Committee was discussed. Sir E.
