— by telegram — 24th November 1927

In connection with his proposals for reorganising the Secretariat, requests telegraphic advice to Martin being appointed Local Govt. Compt. and as a Member of the Executive Council. Also requests advice to proposals shown in draft etc.

I am sorry this has been delayed, first for the receipt of the Governor's Speech of the 25th of October, and latterly by pressure of work. The references to this matter will be found on page 456 of the Governor's Speech of the 25th of October, but the proposed re-organisation is much more fully explained at pages 14 to 19 of the memorandum on the <sup>4</sup> ~~new~~ <sup>new</sup> draft estimates for 1928. I attach a note in more detail the establishment of the Local Government Lands & Settlement Division with which this telegram is more directly concerned.

The recommendations with regard to the establishment of a central authority for Local Government purposes will be found at pages 171 et seqq of Volume II of the Report of the Local Government Commission. They recommended, page 173, the appointment of a Commissioner for Local Government who should be responsible under the Colonial Secretary. This recommendation was discussed at length in Mr. Denham's despatch No. 14 in file X.10220/27, who raised very strong objections to the Commissioner being no administrative head of a Local Government branch of the Secretariat, and the arrangements now proposed

seem to meet these objections as the Commissioner is to have a status as Head of a Department, although the Colonial Secretary remains as the superior, controlling criticizing authority as in the case of other Departments. There can, I think, be no doubt as to the suitability of Mr. Martin for this appointment, and it will be noted that no change in salary is proposed, but that the Governor wishes him appointed a member of the Executive Council pointing out that in practice his attendance is already required at nearly every meeting, and I suppose for this purpose he is summoned as an Extra-ordinary Member under Clause 4 of the Additional Instructions of the 28th of December, 1923. That clause also deals with the general constitution of the Council, but the Governor has the power to make provisional appointments, and if the proposal to appoint Mr. Martin to the Council is approved, it will be necessary to give His Majesty's instructions to that effect in reply to this telegram. In addition to asking for approval for Mr. Martin's appointment as Commissioner and also as a Member of the Executive Council, the Governor requests sanction of the "proposal <sup>stamp</sup> in the draft Estimates", which <sup>is</sup> to be shown generally and commented on in the attached note. As regards the establishment, a point to which particular attention <sup>light</sup> may be drawn is the proposed appointment with salary on the scale £750 - £920. The general proposals also including other similar appointments in the Secretariat, and the similar appointment styled "Junior Secretary".



TELEGRAM from the Governor of Kenya to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

(Dated 24th November Received Colonial Office 4.42.p.m. 24th November, 1927.)

No. 363 of 24th November Proposals for re-organisation of the Secretariat outlined in final paragraph of my speech to the Council on 25th October have been accepted without amendment as printed in draft estimates by select Committee on Estimates and will be passed by the Legislative Council next week. In these proposals Commissioner of Lands will also become Commissioner of Local Government. I propose that Martin should hold both posts at existing salary and that Logan should be his principal assistant. It is important that certain preliminary work connected with the introduction of the Feetham Commission's recommendations should be undertaken without delay. Martin is better qualified than anyone else to conduct such negotiations to success and will I believe secure general agreement on the Commission's recommendations if negotiations are begun at once. The moment is opportune because the Nairobi Municipal Council has just decided by a majority to accept the Commission's recommendations subject to certain financial safeguards. A similar attitude is growing in the outlying areas. With regard to Secretariat reorganisation the Native Affairs branch has now been organised on the same lines as those established in Tanganyika by Cameron. I am issuing instructions in this matter based on his. It is however essential here that the branch dealing with land local Government and settlement shall have an equal status and that Martin as its head should like Maxwell be a Member of the Executive Council. This is all the more necessary (as) Executive Council is constantly concerned with business requiring

Martin's advice and Martin's attendance is already required at nearly every meeting. I request therefore that Martin's appointment as Local Government Commissioner and as Member of the Executive Council together with proposals shown in draft estimates may be approved by telegraph in order that I may push on with settlement of Nairobi question. He should, I think, rank in seniority next to the Chief Native Commissioner.
