Sir,

I have the honour to confirm my telegram No. 5 of the 9th January, which reads as under : -

1. Reference your telegram 22nd December - two members for the temporary Port Advisory Board were chosen as stated at a meeting of the East African Steamship Conference on 17th August, and selected by ten representatives of the Union Castle British India, Clan-Ellerman-Harrison, Deutsche Ost Afrika Linie, Holland Afrika and Navigazione Libera Trestina lines. The two representatives of the Clan-Ellerman-Harrison Line considered their line should be represented on the temporary Board, but other representatives agreed in nominating Campbell and Cumming. In advising you further regarding course I propose to take to appoint to Statutory Board.

2. You will be aware that apart from specially chartered vessels and a few tramp steamers - generally of foreign ownership - all the lines which regularly use the Port are in conference. It was considered advisable in the circumstances to ask the East African Steamship Conference in the first instance for their recommendations regarding nominees to represent ship-owning interests on the temporary Port Advisory Board. You will observe from the accompanying copies

copies of the marginally noted
correspondence that Mr. A. M. Campbell,
of the Union Castle Steamship Line,
ex-Officio Chairman of the East African
Steamship Conference, and Mr. J. Cumming,
of the British India Steam Navigation
Company, were recommended as representa-
tive of ship-owning interests by a meet-
ing comprising representatives of the six
shipping lines which regularly use the
Port of Mombasa. There seemed to me and
my advisers to be no other course than to
appoint these gentlemen who are both in
all respects eminently desirable and suit-
able representatives of the interests in-
volved.

You will I am sure agree that the
appointment of Mr. A. M. Campbell, in virtue
of his position and experience in shipping
matters is of great value to the Harbour
Advisory Board; further to include a
representative of the Clan-Eleerman-Harrison
Lines would mean either adopting the un-
desirable course of increasing the represent-
ation of ship-owning interests on the
Harbour Advisory Board or of excluding the
representative of the British India Steam
Navigation Company, which is the Company
with the largest individual interest in
Mombasa shipping and whose representative,
Mr. J. Cumming, is a member of the long-
established firm of Smith, Mackenzie and
Company which represents the Landings and
Lighterage Company.

3. I understand from your telegram of the 22nd December that the amending Order in Council has been promulgated and upon its adoption two courses will be open to me in making appointments, in concurrence with the advice of my Executive Council:-

(a) To make the appointments without reference to the shipping lines.

(b) To make the appointments after reference to the shipping lines.

I propose to adopt the latter course and to invite the shipping lines to meet and to make recommendations for the appointment of two members.

I am sensible of the volume of freight carried by the Clan-Ellerman-Harrison interests to the Port of Liverpool and how nearly it approximates the Union Castle-British India trade with the Port of London and I am mindful of the relationship between these two lines and the amalgamated Wharfage and Lightorage Companies, but I may state that I have no reason to suppose that the same recommendations will not be made for appointments to the statutory Board.

4. An alternative of increasing the shipping interests on the Board which would possibly secure representation of other lines I cannot recommend, for any change in the constitution of the Port Advisory Board as now accepted would certainly lead to demands

for increased representation from
other interests.

the Acting Colonial Secretary.

The nominations of Mr. Frude to the New York
Advisory Board gave us much pleasure; he has had a long
and deep interest in this Port, and has done much for the
interests of Monrovia.

However, in view of the enormous interest which
this Company has in the shipping of Monrovia as Agents for
the Clan Lines, the Harriss Line, the Hall Line, the
Buckland Line, the Houseboat Line, etc., no idea of this deep
interest can be seen by a glance at page 48 of the Trade
Returns of this country, we think that without doubt the

Copies of your letters addressed to the Steamship Conference in Mombasa have been shown to us, and we have been present at the Conference Meetings when the question of representatives of steamship Owners on the Port Advisory Board has been discussed. At the last meeting of our Conference, the names to be submitted to His Excellency, to fill the vacancies which will be caused by the early retirement of Mr. Sim and Frudd have been submitted to you by the Conference Secretaries.

You will see that we were of the opinion that the name of Mr. A.P.M. Crisp should be submitted to you, Sir, in view of the enormous interest which this Company has in Mombasa shipping.

Mr. Crisp is the General Manager of this Company. We are Agents for the Clan Line, Harrison Line, Hall Line, Bucknall Line, the Houston Line and the Osaka Thosen Kisha. From a glance at page 43 of the Trade Returns of this country will be seen the very great association the above Lines have with this country and Uganda. Mr. Crisp has had fourteen years experience of Zanzibar and Mombasa, and has, of course, the absolute confidence of the Steamship Companies named above. The cargo-carrying Liners are of such great importance to this country, that we feel they should be directly represented on the Port Advisory Board.

It will be of interest for you to know that none of the above Lines has any interest whatsoever, direct or indirect, with any Stevedoring or Lighterage Companies in this country, and Mr. Crisp himself, is not in any way associated with the Kenya Landings and Shipping Co. Ltd. who are Contractors to the Government.

Lastly, the two names that have been submitted to you are both representatives of London Lines, and we do feel that it will be adding value to the composition of the Board if the Liverpool Steamship Companies referred to above are directly represented.

Sir,

I have the honour to refer to telegram No. 859 from the Governor of Kenya dated 13th November and preceding correspondence on the question of the terms of an Order in Council to amend the Kenya and Uganda (Transport) Order in Council 1926.

E. In accordance with the terms of the proposed Order in Council a Port Advisory Board will be appointed and the High Commissioner may make and when made may vary the regulations prescribing the fees and expenses which may be paid or allowed to Members of the Port Advisory Board.

G. In consultation with the General Manager I have given consideration to the remuneration which would be suitable for the Members of the Port Advisory Board and I propose the following remuneration to the Chairman and Members of the Port Advisory Board with effect from the 22nd August 1927, the date on which the first meeting was held.

A. A non-pensionable allowance at the rate of £100 per annum to the Chairman, and

B. A fee of One Guinea a day to Members of the Board on every day on which a meeting is held, together with

1. I propose allowing allowances for those Members who have to leave their normal place of abode to attend meetings of the Board at the rate of 30/- a day, this amount being the amount of Travel allowance which Members of the Railway Council now draw.

4. I propose to differentiate between the remuneration of Members of the Port Advisory Board and that of Members of the Railway Council as their work is essentially different. The Railway Council meets, probably five or six times a year in different places, a meeting on some occasions taking three or four days; the Port Advisory Board on the other hand holds frequent meetings, always in Mombasa and the average since the constitution of the Board has been nearly once a week, an average that is likely to continue for some time until conditions are settled. The Chairman is the Commissioner of Customs who presides at all these meetings and in addition to taking the chair at the meetings he must necessarily perform a considerable amount of work in connection with Port matters in between meetings. This work must be closely connected with that of the Customs Department especially if the system of ad valorem charges is adopted at the Port which seems probable. For these reasons it seems to me suitable that a permanent allowance should be sanctioned for the Chairman.

I refer the recommendation for a definite allowance of £100 a year to the Chairman of the Port Advisory Board for your sanction in accordance with Paragraph 247 of the Colonial Regulations and I trust that this sanction may not be withheld.

5. I have consulted the Governments of both Kenya and Uganda on this question of allowances to the Chairman
