I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Sir E. DeBarnes despatch No. 293 of the 2nd of June and to convey to you my approval of his proposal that the service of Mr. C. H. Collicott from the 17th of September 1917 should be regarded as continuous for pension purposes should he finally retire in favorable circumstances. The break in his service from the 30th of Nov 1922 to the 23rd of July 1923 being treated as leave without pay, not counting as pensionable service.

Sir,

With reference to your despatch No. 948 of the 8th October, 1926, I have the honour to inform you that Mr. G.H. Collaco has now applied that his case be treated on the lines of the ruling given in your despatch No. 1200 of the 21st December, 1926, relative to Mr. R.P. Pereira.

2. Reference to this latter case establishes that it is precisely similar in kind to that of Mr. Collaco whose broken period of service was however the longer. In these circumstances I suggest that the two cases should be treated identically and would recall to your notice the case of Mr. S.R. Lowder, Administrative Officer, referred to in paragraph 3 of Kenya despatch No. 908 of October 12th, 1926.

3. I recommend, therefore, that Mr. Collaco's service from the 7th September, 1917, be allowed ^{to count} as continuous for pension should he ultimately retire in pensionable circumstances, the break in his service from the 30th November, 1922, to the 22nd July, 1925,

due to retrenchment being treated as leave without pay subject to his refunding to Government, the pension he has drawn in respect of that period, viz: Shs. 765/97. This sum he is prepared to repay.

4. This recommendation involves an adjustment of Mr. Collapo's present grading in the Service since his period of service in the Old Ord (present 2nd) Grade would date from January 1st, 1922, the date of his promotion thereto prior to retrenchment. He will consequently become eligible for advancement to the First Grade, on completion of 3 years' service in Grade II, on January 1st, 1928. My recommendation is, therefore, made on the understanding that no claim for arrears of pay prior to the 1st January, 1928, consequent upon the adjustment of his salary will be entertained.

5. I shall be glad to receive your approval of the course proposed.
