At the end of his telegram of the 23rd of July, the Acting Governor referred to three points arising out of the question of exemptions.

(1) Military Officers. The Governor's despatch No. 477 of the 31st of August, 1928, raised the question whether officers who are on the Reserve of Officers, or whose names are still included in the Active List, can be regarded as eligible to enrol in the Defence Force.

The War Office, to whom the matter was referred on the 5th of October, 1928, replied on the 19th November, 1928, that the general question has been considered, and, in the meantime, the Army Council would prefer to postpone any observations on the position in Kenya. The Governor was so informed by the C.O. despatch No. 874 of the 30th November, 1928.

Correspondence on the general question has proceeded on file 61301/29 Genl. and par. 3 of the C.O. letter of the 20th of August last (No. 4 of 61301/29 Genl. says :- "As regards the position of officers of the Reserves in Colonies and Protectorates where there is local legislation imposing compulsory military service, His Lordship is disposed to think, subject to any observations which the Council may desire to offer, that the most convenient course will be formally to exempt such officers from the compulsory provisions. The only possible objection to this course is that in the event of a local emergency requiring the mobilization of the local forces there

An official despatch is coming to you by this mail enclosing correspondence with the Peace Committee of the Society of Friends about the Kenya Defence Force Ordinance. You will see that I have taken the line that I am not prepared to ask the Government of Kenya to repeal the Ordinance, although, as you will no doubt realise, I am personally out of sympathy with anything in the nature of conscription, and if the Ordinance had come before me as a new measure in the form of a Bill, I should certainly not have agreed to its introduction.

I should like you to know that the existence of conscription in Kenya is a

As already shown, failure to enrol is now an offence, and if any District or Resident Commissioner is publishing anything in the nature of a black list of people who allow themselves to be "deemed to be enrolled" rather than attend for enrollment, it is not surprising that a strong exertion is taken, and enquiry on the point is clearly necessary.

(ii) The posting of regimental orders is merely a detail of routine, and does not seem to call for comment.

(iii) The "Times" extract of the 26th October, 1935, states as regards the Estimates for 1936 that "there is an increase of £4,000 in the vote for the Defence Force for the purchase of rifles, and a fortalice, so as to enable a start in the training". The estimate for the Finance Department in the 1935-36 Budget was a similar to £6,000. This again, if the force is an existing organization, follows as a matter of routine.

Force was prominently before the public at that time and at the time of the elections in his speech in the Legislative Council on December 1926, Mr. Sir E. Crisp stated that the Government did not propose to press the Bill in that Council, but to refer the scheme to its authorized desirability to a Select Committee of Council to publish with the help of that Committee the outline of an amended Bill, and to submit that outline to the judgment of the Colony before the elections to be held in January, 1927. He added that there could be no question of pressing such a Bill after the elections unless the elections showed that the general opinion of the Colony favoured it. On January 2nd, 1927, in the Legislative Council, the Acting Governor said that the Unofficial Members on seeking re-election had definitely referred to the Defence Force Bill in their manifesto to the country and all with one pronouncement - who stated that his personal views are in favour of the measure but that he felt that he must be guided by his constituents - had declared their adherence to the principles of the Bill. The Acting Governor said that except in Nairobi, now represented by members who in their speeches in Council both strongly support the Bill and state their position in respect of their constituencies, little criticism of the Bill was heard at any of the elections, while numerous resolutions were passed in its favour. The Bill was passed by 33 to 1 in the Legislative Council, the adverse vote being given by the sole Indian elected member (Mr. Malik) on the ground that the Bill had not been applied to Indians. On the 25th July last, Mr. Aylmer
Commons member of the S. of P.
spoke in the House of Commons in favour of the
Oath of Allegiance, and further that he
should like to institute an
enquiry into the expediency of its enforcement
and said to the S. of P. he had
arrived at the conclusion that an
enquiry will be held, but that in view of the
fact that the Bill had been on the Statute
Book for two years, and actually in operation
during the past year, he was not disposed with
out further consideration to ask the Acting
Secretary to institute any such enquiry.

I have the honour to refer to your confidential despatch No. 30/A of the 21st of May, in which you transmit a Petition against the Defence Bonus BILL forwarded by the Anti-Conscription Committee.

1. As you are aware, there was some delay in dealing with the Bill, owing to the fact that authenticated copies were not at first sent home. In the interval, Mr. Murray had left England and it was necessary that the arrangements for taking and answering His Majesty's pleasure should be made through another Principal Secretary of State.

2. I desire to assure you, however, that careful personal consideration had been given to the Petition, and to the whole question, by Mr. Murray before his departure. He was however, unable to accept the view, which had been put forward, that the introduction of the Bill was against the general wish of the Colony. Indeed the fact that the Bill has been under public consideration for the past four years and was before the electors at the time of the recent elections afforded sufficient evidence against this contention. The understanding on this point which was held in Nairobi resulted in both constituencies in a large majority in favour of the Bill.

The Bill, moreover, was passed in the Legislative Council by a majority of 33 to 1, the only dissentient being the Indian Member, whose opposition was based on the ground that it had not been applied to Indians.

4. As regards the necessity for compulsory enrolment, Mr. Amery was satisfied that it would be difficult if not impossible, in a thinly-peopled and scattered community, to organise a Defence Force satisfactorily on a voluntary basis. Such an attempt would throw an undue burden on those who were willing to serve and would inevitably in course of time, lead to a weak and inefficient organisation. The European population of Kenya have made clear their preference for a more regularised system.

5. In the light of all these considerations Mr. Amery saw no constitutional grounds on which he could intervene or advise His Majesty to withhold his assent. I shall be glad if you will cause the Petitioners to be informed in the sense of this despatch.



Sir,

I am instructed by the Peace Committee of the Society of Friends to submit for the favour of your consideration the following views upon the subject of the conscription of Europeans in Kenya Colony.

The Committee gathers from papers recently to hand from NAIROBI that, following upon the return of the Governor from London to the Colony in August of this year, there has been increased activity on the part of the local Government in the militarisation of the male British community. Thus we gather that a list of the names of those Europeans in the MOMBASA district who have so far declined to enrol in the so-called Defence Force has been posted there [unclear] official authority (Times of East Africa, August 21st, 1929, p. 17) that regimental orders were to be posted in about a fortnight to adult males whether "registered", or "deemed to be registered" (Times of East Africa, September 28th, 1929) while the Governor announces the forthcoming expenditure of £4,500 in the ensuing year upon the supply of rifles and provision of a training camp, (The Times, October 26th, 1929.)

The first of these actions, if correctly described, would appear to be an unworthy attempt to hold individuals up to obloquy for their opinions, - a form of persecution which may well be more potent and coercive in a small dependency than at home.

This Committee has had before it the draft of a petition which, it is understood, was addressed by objectors in the Colony to His Majesty the King, praying that conscription might not be imposed. The memorandum that was delivered with this document implies that the concurrence of a former Secretary of State to the now existing measure was obtained by some degree of misrepresentation, for it contains, among others, the following two consecutive sentences:

"Sir Edward Grigg has stated: I desire to repudiate in the strongest terms all suggestions that the compulsory organisation of Europeans for defence is based upon alarm of any sort regarding our relations

with the King's African subjects in the Colony."

"It is difficult to find words to describe sufficiently vividly the falsity of the impression that such a statement is bound to convey in England. For months past local newspapers have been full of letters and speeches whose burden is that defence is urgently needed against the danger of native trouble."

We understand that the petition was signed by some 1,300 British men and women in the Colony. If the situation at the time that the Defence Force measure was approved is as described in the above quoted sentence it appears to those from whom I write that you thereby be placed in a position to revise, justifiably, the decision that was come to by the previous Secretary of State. But even if this is not so, the Committee wishes respectfully to represent that the arming and drilling of European recruits in a Colony of mixed races is so grave a departure, by your predecessor, from continuity of policy in this matter as to justify reconsideration, by the present Cabinet, of the sanction given by him. It is understood that proposals of the nature complained of were formally placed before Lord Elgin, the Hon. Mr. Lyttleton, Mr. Winston Churchill, the Duke of Devonshire and Mr. Thomas, and rejected by them all.

The members of this Committee believe that the continuation of conscription in Kenya would increase the risks of unlawful action in the Colony, and lead to the forfeiture of the respect . . . only of the native inhabitants, who are in your charge, but also of many who feel that colonisation should not be supported by methods from which we, as a nation, have always disengaged.

The Committee further is convinced that the maintenance of conscription will inevitably bring about a deplorable effect on the condition of young men growing up in the Colony. We believe that a Cabinet which has gone much towards the establishment of peace in the world and has pledged itself to take the lead in definite measures for international reduction and limitation of armaments, might, upon representation from you, be prepared to consider the withdrawal of conscription from Kenya. We therefore beg you to give the matter your careful consideration.


