

Dear Mr Chamberlain

Your letter no. 15550/C/29 dated 2nd June relative to Lieutenant C. H. Hayward, Territorial Army, addressed to Mr. Little, has been referred to me. We agree that Lieutenant Hayward could not be permitted to remain on the active list, & in being permanently resident in Kenya he could not carry out his military obligations. There is no objection to his transferring to the Reserve, though it is doubtful whether any useful purpose would be served by such a move.

We have slightly amended your draft reply as Territorial Army officers on abroad are not automatically compelled to retire. In certain cases they may be compelled, but a man would not be allowed in cases where an officer's wife or family are permanently abroad.

We enclose a copy of your draft letter. A copy of letter of this subject no. 091/2313(C.1) was dispatched to you on 20th June, 1929.

We have made a suggestion as follows to meet the first query in your draft:

It really comes to this that we care do not offer already held "commissions" and we accept transfers from active list to Reserve, we have

no real objection to their having your son the 1st Reserve, but that if they are permanently resident in Kenya

there is really no useful purpose

served by them in consequence



(T) of Kabete in this Colony, and to request you to approach the War Office with a view to ascertaining their opinion as to whether the conditions of service in the Kenya Defence Force precludes permission to remain in the Territorial Army. I understand Lt. Hayward desires to transfer to the Territorial Army Reserve.
