In reply to your letter No. 13679/29 of the 37th of May, addressed to Colonel Jeffries, regarding the vacancy for a Senior Assistant Superintendent of the Line, Kenya and Uganda Railway, I see that Mr. Van Hegan was engaged locally in January 1918 as a Guard and it appears that his experience of railway working is confined entirely to the Kenya and Uganda Railway. In any case, as he was only 21 when he joined the railway any experience which he may have had prior to joining would necessarily have been obtained from serving in a junior capacity and would not be of much value. We are unable to trace back his ever taken any course of instruction on Indian Railways during his leave of absence. As we have no occasion to interview him we are unable to express any opinion as to his personal fitness for the post, but in view of his steady promotion it would appear that he is an officer who has worked hard and given satisfaction, and it is therefore our opinion, that with his local knowledge he would be better fitted for the post than


When the Crown Agents were first consulted with regard to this vacancy, they recommended Mr. J.O. Sanders, Malaya, as the first string, and Mr. W.F.D. Allison, Tanganyika Railways, as second choice. Since then, however, it has become necessary to consider filling the post of Chief Mechanical Engineer, and for this Mr. Sanders will probably be recommended by the Crown Agents. Also, a despatch has been received from the High Commissioner for Transport recommending that Mr. W.A. Andrews, now Assistant Workshop Manager, who has been on the maximum of his scale, £920, since the 1st January 1928, should be promoted to the post of Mechanical Engineer (and Workshop Manager). The High Commissioner says that he notes that this is one of those senior technical appointments for which the Secretary of State has probably a panel of names of officers in the Colonial Service, but at the same time, he recommends the promotion of Mr. Andrews who has rendered long and faithful service to the Railway and has one more tour to complete before retirement. The matter has again been referred to the Crown Agents, to whom Sir James Carmichael has replied that they are afraid that they cannot support Sir Edward Grigg's recommendation for promoting Mr. Andrews. They point out that his experience and training up to 1924 when he was made Assistant Works Manager, was entirely <sup>in</sup> woodwork, joinery and carriage and wagon building, so they think it most desirable that the man appointed to the post should have more experience in mechanical engineering, especially
