The question of interest charges can await the despatch which the Governor promises on page 6 of Appendix II.

There is no provision under this Head for £8,000 for further requirements which also does not seem to call for objection in itself.

G. Water Supplies.

The only item calling for comment here is the additional provision of £62,100 for the Mombasa water supply which also involves a further £6,200 under Establishment Charges. This matter has already been under consideration in other correspondence and prior to the receipt of this despatch, the Treasury were approached, semi-officially, asking them to agree - subject to a definite expression of opinion from the Crown Agents (which has now been received) in favour of the scheme on the technical side, to approval of the proposals being given generally and to an assurance being given to the Governor that the necessary provision would be included in the Loan schedule and that the work may be proceeded with. Mr. Waterfield might now be informed that we have, as a matter of fact, now received the general loan proposals, but that, in view of the urgency in this case, and that the Crown Agents are satisfied with the technical aspects, we should still be glad to be able to communicate with the Governor as proposed, in advance of the consideration of the general proposals, which will ~~necessarily~~ take

D. Communications. £189,400.

This includes £86,200 for main roads and bridges, £4,300 for roads to famine areas and £37,100 for feeder roads. (Establishment Charges are in addition to these figures). The famine areas concerned are the Meru and Kitui Districts. Details of the roads to be constructed under other items are given without any explanation. It would have been useful to have some indication as to how far they are distributed between native and European areas. So far as can be judged on the map, only a small proportion would lie within the boundaries of any Native Reserves. It is, of course, true that roads outside these reserves may be of considerable indirect benefit to the natives. This is a point on which further information might be asked. The remaining items relate to telephone extensions and a point is made of the fact that of the total expenditure on these extensions a very substantial proportion will be spent on material coming from this country.

E. Miscellaneous.

This includes an item of £250,000 for the purchase of the Protectorate from the Sultan of Zanzibar. This is one of the matters which the Treasury thought might be deferred, but since then there has been considerable correspondence with the Secretary of State.

A. Railway Development.

In total of £400,000 is included for certain Branch Lines in regard to which the Governor (pages 18-19 of Appendix II) promised separate despatches. It will be noted that in the case of the extensions, that of North Kavirondo, it should be financed from the savings on the Branch Line provision ~~per~~ ^{£125,000} which has already been approved. The £100,000 main line improvements is the same amount as that originally suggested in the Governor's previous despatch of the 7th December 1929, and ~~but excludes~~ the £300,000 for rolling stock this is £160,000 less than the amount suggested in a earlier despatch. With reference to correspondence terminating with Your Lordship's Confidential telegram of the 16th January, on the subject of the loan requirements of the Colony and/or the Transport Administration, as requested, I have the honour to submit the following observations upon the loan position, the future borrowing requirements and the general financial prospects of the two Administrations.

2. The existing commitments covered by issued loans are shown in detail in the accompanying Sessional Loan Statement; summarised the position is :-

3. Before considering the further requirements of the Colony and of the Railway and Harbour services there are certain aspects of the loan policy of recent years to which I desire to invite Your Lordship's attention.

- (a) It will be observed that of a total Colonial public debt of £13,500,000, £1,414,283 only has been incurred by the Colony. In other words on account of its ability to go upon the market, a recourse denied to the Transport Administration by reason of the provisions of the Colonial Stock Acts, the Colony's credit has borne the incidence of flotation of £12,085,717 sterling on behalf of the Railways and Harbours.
- (b) In considering this sum of £12,085,717 the share of the Uganda Protectorate must be taken into account. That Protectorate also is unable to take advantage of the Colonial Stock Acts, it shares with Kenya the necessity of developing the mutual transport services and, though no precise apportionment of the relative charges is possible, it is understandable that advantage has been taken of the constitutional position of Kenya in financing the Transport Administration in Uganda. (c) Furthermore the Transport Administration as a
result of assimilating its rates to those of
the Tanganyika Railways, a railway enjoying the
advantage of mineral loads, had made reduction
to the extent of £170,000 by the end of 1929.
In its turn this sacrifice has reacted upon the
Betterment Fund and so upon the Railway loan re-
quirements in both Kenya and Uganda.

In making these statements I have not forgotten the
fact that for a number of years, and although a Railway
Renewals and Betterment Fund existed, Kenya benefited
financially by reason of its control of the Uganda
Railway.

My purpose is, however, to show that the
development of the Colony, retarded to an incalculable
degree by the part it played in the East African
Campaign, has suffered still more by its association
with the urgent demands of the East African trans-
port system. This system serves not only Kenya, a
country of uniform agricultural production, but also
Uganda, a country largely dependent upon a single
crop which has been subject to sudden and serious
fluctuations as regards both quantity and value, as
a part of Tanganyika territory.

It remains to suggest a remedy, and in my
view the evil can only be successfully treated by
the inauguration of an East African central authority
which, possessing powers under the Colonial Stock Act,
would be able to separate Transport loans, both
existing/

existing and future, from the Colonial issues and
so to ensure uniformity of development.

4. I now return to the details of the requirements of both the Colony and the Transport Administration, uncovered by issued loans, and in paragraphs 7.-9 the general financial position of the Colony and the Railway and the ability of the two Administrations to meet loan charges is discussed. 10. It is clear from the general review of the loan position that the development of the Colony has fallen considerably behind that of the Railways and harbours, a state of affairs to which the late Sir Christian Nelling drew attention in 1927 and which, as he then said, would hamper the development of both Administrations. I have shown that the demands of transportation in Uganda must bear their share in what has been done in Kenya.

From paragraphs 7 and 8 of this despatch Your Lordship will have seen that the droughts of 1927 and 1928 and the locust infestation of 1929 have had an adverse effect upon the general trade position and I hesitate to recommend that the advances on loan account should be consolidated in a market issue until the total effect of the climatic and other factors of the last three years is clear, particularly at a time when there is a world-wide depression in trade and until the constitutional position in East Africa is clear.

I have no doubt that a complete recovery will soon be apparent in Kenya; the immediate recuperative powers of African countries is a truism.

There is every reason for faith in the agricultural, industrial and commercial prosperity of the Colony and I consider it essential that immediate steps should be taken to broaden the basis of public utility, health and educational services.

11. Subject to your Lordship's concurrence
I propose :-

- (a) That the Schedule of Colonial and Transport Development in paragraph 4 of this despatch, as contained in Appendix II, should be regarded as final advances until 1932, save under most abnormal circumstances.
- (b) That until 1932 I should not have the power of variation within the following items:-

and that any variation between sub-heads should be exercised after reference to Your Lordship and to Legislative Council; reference also being made to Legislative Council in the case of variation between numbered items in the schedule in paragraph 4 above.

In this connection it will be realised that the Guarantee of Uganda upon item 6 of the £7,000,000 Loan (1928) and upon item 7 of the £3,500,000 Loan (1928) continues and that of the sum of £6,149,894, £611,149 in respect of Colonial

Development forms Item 8 of the £3,000,000 Loan
(1928).

In compliance with Your Lordship's instructions, I have, in this despatch, submitted a comprehensive survey of the loan position of both the Colonial and Transport Administrations and while I realise that the issues involved will require the fullest consideration, I trust Your Lordship will not consider me impudent in asking that a summary of the reply may be communicated to me by telegram.

I would also point out that the development of the Colony, and therefore its ability to carry loan commitments both for Colonial and Transport Services, have been adversely affected by the long period of uncertainty created by the delay in coming to a decision on the Closer Union question, on Imperial policy as regards the promotion and assistance of closer settlement, and on certain other questions which concern the prospects of non-native production in the settled areas. Potential settlers and investors are naturally awaiting these decisions before committing themselves and their capital to the Colony; these handicaps have been seriously aggravated by a long period of defective rainfall, locust infestation, and the fall in world-prices for agricultural produce. There is every sign, however, that this period of adversity is, as regards climatic conditions, at an end. The heavy rains of recent months, though they have, for the moment caused much inconvenience and loss in the grain-growing areas,

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areas, will undoubtedly increase production of all kinds in the near future. The opportunity for new development will therefore be excellent, and I trust most sincerely that there will not be any such further delay in reaching decisions on the political and constitutional questions affecting development as would cause that opportunity to be lost. Equally important is the need of freeing this Colony from that part of its loan liability for Transport Services which it carries on behalf of the Uganda Protectorate and thus enabling it to undertake a development of its own equipment and services corresponding to the excellent Transport Services which have hitherto absorbed by far the greater portion of its loan facilities.

These considerations so closely affect the main subject of this despatch that I venture to hope they will receive Your Lordship's attention in coming to a decision on the recommendations which I have made.

The forgoing provision is, as stated above, an instalment of a £410,000 programme.

The Establishment Charges are estimated at £5,900.

Item D.1(e). Makupa Causeway. £50,000.

The actual expenditure by the Colony has been £38,000, the balance of £12,000 will be needed for surfacing the Causeway and preparing the approaches prior to handing the work over to the Mombasa Municipal Board.

Item D.1(f). Road Plant. £46,500.

Item B.2. Trunk Telephone Nairobi to Nakuru. £12,600.

Further Requirements. £4,100.

A Trunk circuit between Nairobi and Nakuru is under construction. The second line now proposed is intended to pick up traffic and provide telephone facilities at important intermediate points as Gilgil, Naivasha, Kijabi and to bring this traffic into the Nairobi or Nakuru trunk centres. Of the £4,100 estimated £3,100 would be spent in Great Britain. The net revenue, i.e. gross receipts less maintenance and operating charges is calculated to average £150 per annum over the first five years.

Item D.3. Trunk Telephone, Nairobi to Mombasa £40,675.

This approved item is shown on Page 7 of
Appendix I, the Sessional Loan Statement for
April, 1930.

Item D.4. Reconstruction of Nakuru to Eldoret Telegraph Route, and erection thereon of a trunk telephone circuit. £12,500.

The proposal forms part of a comprehensive scheme for providing main telephone trunk routes to serve developed areas and to provide links between those areas and Nairobi and the Coast. In particular the proposal will bring the large producing areas of the Uasin Gishu

Plateau and the Trans Nzoia into telephone communication with Nakuru and thence to Nairobi and Mombasa. Reconstruction is necessary in order to convert the route into a permanent one, and to strengthen it sufficiently to carry additional circuits. The average net revenue over the first five years is estimated at £800 per annum. The sum of £16,500 would be expended upon material ordered in England.

The proposal involves an additional expenditure by the Railway of £12,300.

Item D.5. RECONSTRUCTION OF NAKURU TO KISUMU TELEGRAPH ROUTE AND ERECTION THEREON OF A TRUNK TELEPHONE CIRCUIT - £12,000.

This proposal is also a part of a comprehensive scheme for linking up developed areas with each other and with Nairobi and Mombasa. In particular it will serve the producing highland areas between Nakuru and Kisumu and be an artery connecting the settlement at Kericho, Sotik and Molo with the Colony's main trunk system. Reconstruction is necessary to improve the existing route, which is the main telegraph route, to Uganda and to strengthen it sufficiently to carry additional circuits. The average net revenue over the first five years is estimated at £500 per annum. The sum of £11,100 would be spent on material in Great Britain.

The proposal involves an additional expenditure of £6,000 by the Transport Administration.

Item D.6. Trunk Telephone Nairobi-Thika-Fort Hall-Nyeri to Nanyuki. £2,500.

A Trunk line already exists from Nairobi to Thika but this line is congested at times and a long distance telephone service becomes debased if too many stations are included in the one line. The proposed line would serve the native area of Fort Hall and the important settled areas of Nyeri and Nanyuki. Your Lordship will agree that the administrative facilities which this line would give to the conduct of affairs in the Kikuyu Reserve are not small. The average net revenue per annum over the first five years is estimated at £150. The sum of £3,500 would be expended in Great Britain upon material.

Item D.7. Telephone line Kisumu to Kisii. £4,500.

The question of constructing this administrative line has been under consideration for some years and is a necessary facility for the administration of an important Native Reserve containing some 300,000 natives and the development of a growing trading centre which is nearly 100 miles from the nearest telegraph Office.

The average net revenue per annum for the first five years is estimated at £150. This proposal involves an expenditure of £3,000 in Great Britain on material.

This matter is dealt with in Your Lordship's Confidential despatch of the 6th February, 1930, and in paragraph 4 of this despatch. It will be the subject of a separate despatch.

Item E.4. Land Bank. £210,000.

This figure is tentative and Your Lordship's remarks in regard to this proposal are under consideration. The sum has Your Lordship's approval but no Resolution has yet been placed before Legislative Council.

Item A. 3. Kedowa to Kericho Branch Railway £500,000.

A separate despatch will be sent upon this proposal which is briefly to construct a branch railway 42 miles in length from Kedowa to Jamji a point a few miles south of Kericho. At this point a decision can be made upon the future extension of this branch so as to tap further the produce of the South Kavirondo District, the most fertile District of the Nyanza Province, containing some 500,000 natives, and the Buret-Sotik areas of both European and native cultivation.

Line

Item A. 4. Extension of the North Kavirondo Branch to Butere. £50,000.

This proposed extension is 10 miles in length into the most fertile portion of the North Kavirondo District and is advocated by the Administration, the natives, the Kisumu Chamber of Commerce and the Missionary Authorities.

As stated it can be financed from the balance of an approved sum of £125,000, £81,900 of which has been expended upon the Nanyuki Branch Railway, and from the anticipated savings on that allocation. A separate despatch will be sent to Your Lordship upon this project.

Item A.5. Branch Railway Thika to Donyo Sabuk
£50,000.

A separate despatch will be sent upon this proposal which is to construct a branch 9 miles in length from Thika towards Donyo Sabuk where there is already considerable sisal cultivation and where a large area remains suitable for either European or native production.

Item A. 6. Main Line Capital Improvements £100,000.

This includes Goods Shed, Cranes, Machinery, Workshops, Water Supplies, Staff Quarters, Workshops, Stores Buildings, Telephone Lines, Tyre Tablets and additional Marine Craft. Your Lordship's despatch No. 155 of 7.12.29. is referred to the marginally cited correspondence in this connection.

Item A. 7. Rolling Stock. £25,000.

From the amount sanctioned by Your Lordship's predecessor there remained a sum of £25,000 for which a Resolution was passed in Legislative Council on the 4th April, 1950.

Further Requirements. £300,000.

In addition I have been advised by the Inter-Colonial Railway Council that immediate steps should be taken to place order for Rolling Stock at an estimated cost of £150,000 and that it will also be necessary in the near future to make further purchases at an estimated cost of £150,000. In addition to this the Railway Administration consider that additional purchases to an estimated

telegram of the 20th March, relative to the financial provision necessary for the construction of the Central Offices of this Government and for the building of New Law Courts. I have the honour to state that the following Motion was carried in Legislative Council on the 10th April last :-

"Be it resolved that this Council hereby approves the expenditure of a sum of £290,000 upon the purposes specified in the schedule hereto and undertakes to approve the inclusion of such sum in the Schedule to a future Loan Ordinance together with such further sums as may be necessary to cover the cost of the issue of such Loan."

Be it Resolved that this Council hereby rescinds its resolution of the 10th July 1929, approving the provision of £110,000 for Law Courts.

2. In connection with the Central Offices it has now been decided that the site will be upon a piece of rising ground, overlooking the town of Nairobi, which will be known to those members of Your Lordship's staff who have recently visited Kenya as the present site of the Secretariat.

The architectural treatment of the building will be in the hands of Sir Herbert Baker, A.R.A., and Mr. Hoogerp, who proposes to visit England for consultation with Sir Herbert in the near future and who will then be able to produce plans and drawings of the building should Your Lordship so desire. I am confident that the building will become a dignified addition to the town of Nairobi and will, with the new Law Courts, set a standard of architecture.

3. Your Lordship will remark that the sum of £154,000, covered by the motion of the 16th April, is a considerable reduction on the sum of £910,000 to which approval was given in your telegram of the 21st June. Further consideration of the original proposals, which contained a sum of £50,000 for road approaches, has led me to the conclusions that the building contemplated could be achieved with some financial benefit by a scheme of construction by instalments and that the necessary sum for road approaches could be reduced until there is a settled Town Plan for Nairobi.

To the estimate of £144,000 for the abridged scheme must be added £5,000 for terracing and £5,000 for road approaches, a total of £154,000 exclusive of equipment.

Your Lordship may rest assured that the abridged scheme and design is capable of evenly balanced additions. It will be observed that the chief Departments without accommodation in the proposed building are those of Agriculture, Forests and Public Works.

4. The understanding that in order to provide the sum of £26,000 for a third storey to the Law Courts a corresponding reduction should be made in the General Offices allocation, to which Your Lordship's Confidential telegram of the 20th March refers, has been kept, vide paragraph 3 above. The Departments for which accommodation has been found in the third storey are those of the Registrar General, the Surveyor General and the Commissioner of Prisons, all of whom have business in the Courts.

The new Law Courts, for which Sir Herbert Baker, A.R.A., is also the Consulting Architect, will form the dominating feature of the City Square and a nucleus for other buildings of a civic nature. In this connection, vide Your Lordship's telegram of the

the 21st June, I propose dealing with the requirements of the District Offices and Police Headquarters in the final schedule of Loan Proposals in the near future.

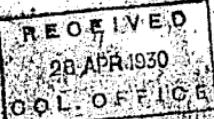
In both the case of the Central Offices and Law Courts I am advised that expedition and economy will result if the buildings are constructed by contract.

New Law Courts.

In view of economic and architectural advantages which will accrue from adding another story to the existing plan, I am anxious after consultation with the architect and on the unanimous advice of my Executive Council to submit Resolution to the Legislative Council early in April covering additional expenditure of £26,000 for this purpose. Accommodation would be allotted to the Registrar General Survey and Registration Department and I am prepared to reduce proportionately allocation for central offices already authorised in your telegram 21st June. I should be glad to have your decision by telegram.
