I have the honour to refer to Colonial Regulation No. 287, which lays down that the

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authority for expenditure lapses with the close of the financial year, and to inform Your Lordship that strict observation of the provisions of this regulation inevitably leads to difficulties that it is suggested might be avoided should Your Lordship feel disposed to grant the concession sought; despatch.

2. The Estimates for the Colony are nowaprepared in a manner which shows as closely as possible at the time of estimation the emount of money which will be required by way of revote on works which have been sanctioned but not dempleted in the year .- To the extent to which provision would for revotes in the Estimates for the ensuing difficulty arises but it is not possible to ensure in all cases that expenditure which has been authorised is fully incurred before the end of the previous financial year, although at the time the Estimates were prepared it was anticipated that the service would be completed before the end of the year. In such cases the specific item concerned has been approved by the Legislature and by Your Lordship; it has been thought probable that the necessary money would have been aid out by the end of the year; and unforeseen circum-

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circumstances alone have delayed payment's.

In reacing the proposal before Your LordThip I have in mind a number of items which were
approved during the year 1029 and in respect of which
it was not in all cases possible to be sure that the
full expenditure authorised would be incurred before
the end of the year :-

- (i) On the 4th January, 190, I received an application for a sum of £3,825 to complete the Logust. Campaign on lines which had already received four Lordship's sanction, the intention being that the campaign was to cease by the 20th January, by which time the infestation of hoppers should have passed. The amount involved exceeds £2,500 and I was aware that, strictly speaking, your Lordship's prior sanction was required for the expenditure in 1930. As, however, the service had already received your Lordship's approval in 1929, I considered that I was justified it signing the warrant in order to enable the work to proceed without interruption.
- (ii)Other cases arise from time to time in which comparatively large single payments are authorised very shortly before the end of the year (for instance, £7,000 authorised in Second Supplemental)

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- iii) Non-requirement Items of work on roads and bridges under the head Public Works Extraordinary which have been approved during the previous year but are not completed by the end of the year require funds from the sum set aside for that purpose in Estimates, no part of which in so far as the Estimates for 1930 are conceived, is shown as money to be revoted.
- In such cases the strict application of the rule would cause inconvenience and possibly loss. In the case of an unfinished public work, it would entail the suspension of activities on the 31st December, possibly involving the dispersion of labour.
- onsideration that in the case of specific items of work which have been fully authorised in the previous year and for which the unspent balance of money previously voted is required to continue the work after the close of the financial year the covernor be empowered to authorise the agassary expenditure without prior reference to the Secretary of State whether or not funds for the purpose have been provided in the Estimates for the year.
