My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to the first paragraph of Your Lordship's confidential despatch of the 23rd January, 1933, and to Your Lordship's enquiry whether the proposed investigation by the "censosities" or sampling method to obtain statistical data relating to native labour within and without the Native Reserves, as contemplated in paragraph 4 of Sir Edward Grigg's confidential despatch No. 134 of the 21st October, 1932, had been undertaken.

2. It is with regret that I have to inform Your Lordship that it has not yet been found possible to carry out this investigation nor does it appear likely that I shall be in a position to give instructions for its performance in the near future.

3. I am quite convinced of the importance of such an investigation as the one proposed, and am anxious that it shall be carried out at the earliest possible opportunity but I have been reluctantly compelled to put aside the idea for the present owing to the fact that the Labour Section has not the requisite staff. The number of Labour Inspectors is now only three and the entire time of these officers is taken up in carrying out actual

inspections, etc.

4. To obtain the statistical data required would, if they were to be of real value, occupy the entire time of one officer for a year and in the present conditions of financial stringency in the Colony there appears no immediate prospect of detailing an officer for this duty.

5. With reference to paragraph 2 of Your Lordship's despatch No. 1013 of the 23rd December, 1930, financial considerations do not provide the only reason for the decision not to embark on a census of the whole native population in connection with the Imperial ^{this} census of year. The project was referred to a meeting of Provincial Commissioners in March 1930 for their advice and they gave it as their unanimous opinion that "no more accurate figures of native population would be obtained by any elaborate methods of counting than those obtained at present from hut counters records." In view of this opinion it was decided that it would be not only a waste of money but also a waste of time and effort to undertake a census on lines other than those of the annual count for taxation purposes. In this connection I take the opportunity of informing Your Lordship that this annual count which is made by Native ^{line} counters and checked as may be necessary by District Officers is believed to provide an approximately accurate census of the adult native population. Owing to the traditional superstitions which among most tribes of Kenya holds it to be unlucky for an owner to count his possessions, &c., at least to report the number of his possessions to a stranger, no reliance whatever can be placed on the numbers of children recorded as the notifications of their parents and as a consequence estimating the



3. On the other hand, it has occurred to me that it might be possible for a complete native census to be carried out in sections, i.e., ^{Gibc} district by ^{Gibc} district over a period of years. The results would not, of course, synchronise, but a body of information would be built up which would be very useful and the money cost would be spread over a longer period.

I regard numerical accuracy as of less importance than ~~the~~ estimates founded on discreet enquiry, not necessarily simultaneous, and if it were possible to proceed with my suggestion a complete simultaneous census could then await better ~~a more convenient opportunity~~ time.

4. I should be glad if you would consider this suggestion and inform me of your views upon it.

NOTE AS TO NATIVE CENSUS.

(50429/25)

In a despatch dated the 10th October, 1925, the Governor of Kenya reported that action was being taken to provide for a census of the non-native population on the 1st February, 1926, and for a census of natives to be taken at a date to be determined subsequently. The despatch also enclosed one, in which he informed the other East African Governors and the British Resident at Zanzibar similarly, adding that it would, of course, be a great advantage if a census of the natives of East Africa could be taken at the same time, and he proposed, therefore, to list this subject for discussion at the Governors' Conference which was held early in 1926.

About the same time, the ~~Governors'~~
^{Unofficial} Conference met at Tukuyu, and one of their ~~were~~
^{asked} resolutions ~~was~~ asked the Governments of the five territories to collect and disseminate better native vital statistics.

The summary of the proceedings at the Governors' Conference included the following in regard to the question of native census: "The Conference took note of the resolution of the Tukuyu Conference, and considered - That the Governments concerned were fully alive to the necessity of the provision of better native vital statistics". The Secretary of State's despatch of the 21st August, dealing with the Conference resolutions as a whole, but did not refer to this question.

As regards the census to be held in 1931, provision to the extent of £800 for the preliminary expenses was made in the first Supplementary Estimates for 1930, where it was explained that it was proposed to take in 1931 a non-native census of the whole Colony, and a complete census of the towns of Mombasa, Nairobi, and possibly, any other upcountry towns for which complete details of population are required. The full expenditure is estimated at £3,000, and an additional £2,200 has been provided in the Draft Estimates for 1931.

Reference may also be made to the remarks on the question of the census in the report on the Statistical Department of the Conference of East African Governors, 1926-1929, which contains the following remarks with regard to the census:-

"Proposals for taking a complete Census in all Territories were submitted to the various Governments early in 1929. The Kenya Government have decided to take a Non-Native Census in 1931, together with a complete census of all people residing in the principal towns. Uganda has agreed in principle to a complete Native Census to be taken on a modified system which has been worked out in the Central Statistical Office, and will shortly be submitted to all the Governments concerned. The Governments of Tanganyika, Zanzibar and Northern Rhodesia,

Rhodesia, have stated that they do not intend to take a complete census, and no further information has yet been received concerning a programme for a Non-Native Census in 1931. The whole of the work connected with the Kenya and Uganda Census will be dealt with on the Hollerith Machines, and the Tables compiled and submitted to the Governments concerned in the form of a complete report.

My Lord,

I have the honour to inform Your Lordship that, after consultation with my Executive Council, I have issued directions that during the month of March, 1931, a census shall be taken

- (a) of all non-native inhabitants of the Colony;
- (b) of all persons residing within the jurisdiction of the Municipality of Nairobi; and
- (c) of all persons residing within the jurisdiction of the Municipal Board of Mombasa.

Mr. A. Walter, Statistician to the Governors' Conference, has been appointed Superintendent of the Census, the date of which has been fixed for the 6th March.

2. I have authorised the Statistician to engage two Europeans and four Asiatics to act as enumerators in the town of Nairobi. The Europeans will be employed for work in Muthaiga and Kilimani and the Asiatics in the central portion of the town. The work performed is part-time work and I have authorised the following remuneration, subject to Your Lordship's covering sanction:

Chaturbhai Umedbhai Patel,	£15,
Rambhai Goverdhanbai Amim,	£15,

3. Mr. Griffiths is not at present in employment but is a candidate for the Police. The Asiatics named above are at present employed in the Native Registration Department and their knowledge of the town will be invaluable. The name of the second European to be employed has not yet been submitted.

4. I trust that there will be no objection to the officers named being allowed to work overtime and draw the allowance recommended. This is both the most economical and the most efficient procedure and is, I understand, the procedure generally adopted in census work in other colonies.

5. As Your Lordship is aware, a sum of £800 was voted in First Supplementary Estimates, 1930, for preliminary expenses in connection with this census. The balance of the estimated expenditure, namely, £2,200, is being inserted in Draft Estimates, 1931.
