GOVERNMENT POLICY.

29. Mr. CHARLES BUXTON asked the Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies whether, in view of the statement in the Secretary of State's Memorandum on Native Policy in East Africa, that persons of every race, 'coloured no less than white, have a right to equal treatment in accordance with their several needs; the Government of Kenya Colony has yet advised him as to any amendments which will be required in existing legislation in order to bring it into strict conformity with the policy laid down in the said memorandum?

The UNDER-SECRETARY OF STATE for the COLONIES (Dr. Drummond Shiels): Yes, Sir. A telegraphic statement has been received from the Acting Governor of Kenya. From this it appears that a few amendments in the Colony legislation may be desirable; but the matter cannot be dealt with satisfactorily by telegraph, and the Acting Governor will forward a comprehensive statement by mail for my Noble Friend's consideration.

Hon. Admiral BEAMISH: Does the hon. Gentleman accept the implication in the question that the several races are not receiving equal treatment?

Dr. SHIELS: I did not notice any implication.

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
