

ANNUAL REPORT.ANNUAL REPORT FOR THEYEAR ENDING MAY 1ST, 1890.

MAY,

The following report is given on the condition of the lumber yard at Pleasant during the year just ended May 1st, 1890.

1. **Buildings.**—The building of the lumber truck and in front of the mill has continued, but for the greater part of the winter the work was only done during the day time.

2. **Inventory.**—This was increased by 1000 feet and now totals 2000 feet of lumber and 1000 board feet of shingles.

3. **Timber Mill.**—The strength of the mill is still the same. Its present condition is not good enough to warrant its being used again, but it would have been repaired during the summer, but the blocks required to do this are out of the country.

4. **Bank.**—The building of the new concrete structure is as close up to the bank setting as it is possible to bring it.

5. **Land.**—Gone to proceeding slowly.

6. **Salaries.**—This has followed closely the increasing.

b. Architect of City. A start has been made to

lay the public bottoming out at 100 ft. distance from
the south end building.

c. City Streets. A considerable amount of the
improvement in the city streets has been made and a street
has been laid out in the State office block.

d. City Market. The arrival of the order for
steel work has been delayed but the progress has been
good. As a result of repairing damage to the foundations
an additional plan delayed further has been obtained
from architect, and took up the market early in January.

e. City Superintendent. The improvements in
plastering anticipated at the end of December did not
take place, but the completion of the block is very
much being impeded by the bad weather over the last and
intermediate parts of the first floor had been completed
the 141 feet from the south end, and a layer of 12 feet
of flooring laid down. Work is proceeding on the
columns and roof also the first floor. A slight improve-
ment in the progress sick place in hospital still work is
still going on very slowly. Strong representations have
been made and are being made to the contractors in this
connection. Most of the steelwork for the block is now
on the site.

f. Quarries. The 40 ft. roadway at the north end
of Block No. 1 has been formed and some pitching laid.

g. Electric Power. Two 3 ton steam engines,
two 1 ton electric and two horse power engines, and five tinned
engines were due for arrival in England in January. At
present all except one of these are ready. The

Contractors attribute the delay to the difficulty in getting the electrical parts from the makers.

Mr. JONES. — The expectation that progress will improve, especially on the Chaco, appears to have proved true in our last quarterly report. This has been confirmed. Progress during the quarter has been particularly slow. There were slight signs of improvement at the end of the quarter, the Contractors having strengthened all their supervising staff, and the local labour force which had been idle since the close of work last August 15 days at least, after which it was confidently hoped would be ready by 1st May, will not be ready before August. The Contractors have not given 31st August, 1924, as the date on which they anticipate completing the contract. A separate communication has been addressed to you on this subject.

Sir,

With reference to your telegram of the 9th May, 1925, I have to report that on the recommendation of Messrs. Bengal Palmer and Tritton, Mr. George Walters has been engaged as Foreman Brewer for the erection of the Maragua Viaduct on the Mvita Nyeri Extension. Two copies of the form of agreement which he has completed in respect of this engagement are enclosed together with particulars of his experience.

2. In view of the indefinite period of Mr. Walters' engagement the Secretary of State decided that the Widows' and Orphans' Pension Scheme is not applicable in his case but had agreed that he should be insured against liability under the Workmen's Compensation Act and against personal accident and death in sum of £500 each. This has been done for one year, as from the 1st May and should his services be retained beyond this period we shall do our best to receive due notice in order that the period of insurance may be extended.

3. On the recommendations of the Consulting Engineers Mr. Walters has been overlooking the work at the yard of the Patent Shaft and Axletree Company since the 23rd February, during which period in accordance with the terms of his agreement he has been paid salary at the rate of £6. per week. As advised in our telegram of the 11th May a passage has been provided for Mr. Walters in the.s.s. "Makara" due to leave England on the 16th instant.
