NOTE VERBALE.

His Britannic Majesty's Embassy have the honour to refer to the forthcoming session of Jubaland.

His Britannic Majesty's Government have had under consideration the Note Verbale No. 309384/54, S./F<sup>o</sup> of the 11th ultimo in which the Royal Italian Ministry for Foreign Affairs expressed an earnest hope that the actual session of the territory might not be delayed until the completion of the boundary delimitation. His Majesty's Government, after consultation with the Acting Governor of Kenya, agree that the transfer of the administration of the territory should take place without awaiting a settlement of the points arising out of Article VII and A of the Treaty. It is assumed that as from the date of the session, the administrative control of the whole of the transferred territory will be taken over by the Royal Italian authorities. Great importance however is attached to the fullest possible notice of the proposed date of cession being given to the Government of Kenya, and it is suggested that the date fixed upon in conjunction with the Royal authorities for the transfer should be such as to permit of at least one clear month's notice being given to that Government.

The Embassy are instructed to enquire whether any information can now be given as to the arrangements of the Royal Government for the appointment of the Italian section

of the Joint Commission. The British technical staff, consisting of Lieut.-Colonel L.F.H.I. King, O.B.E., R.E., and a sergeant of the Royal Engineers will leave for East Africa on April 18th.

His Majesty's Government have ~~also~~ considered the Note Verbale No. 210865/63, s/v, of the 20th ultime from the Royal Ministry for Foreign Affairs, relative to the proposed exchange of Notes to define ~~the~~ meaning of the expression "boundary between the provinces of Jubaland and Tana-land" contained in article 1 of ~~the~~ Treaty of July 18th, 1924, and repeated in other articles of the same Treaty.

It is noted that, in the opinion of the Royal Italian Government, the formula previously suggested by His Majesty's Government does not appear sufficiently precise and upon further consideration, His Majesty's Government are advised that there is room for further doubt as to the suitability of the formula, for the following reason.

The definition of the former Tana-land-Jubaland provincial boundary laid down as the north-western extremity of the boundary the point where the Lak Dera joins the Lorien swamp. This point has not, however, been precisely determined, and it is understood that the nature of the locality in question will render the determination of the actual point of confluence of the Lak Dera with the Lorien swamp a matter of some difficulty, while the point of confluence was sufficiently precise for the purpose of describing the boundary between the two provinces of Tana-land and Jubaland

within the territory of Kenya Colony, it is considered that it may not be found suitable as a basis for the determination of the International boundary between Italian and British territory.

The following formula is therefore proposed:-

"Having regard to the fact that Ras Kiambone (Dick's Head) and the four small islands which are in its immediate vicinity form part of the territory to be transferred to Italy, it is understood that upon reaching the meridian east of Greenwich which leaves in Italian territory the well of Al Seru (or such other meridian west of Greenwich as may be recommended by the Commissioner) in accordance with paragraph 3 of Article 1 of the Treaty, the boundary southwards to the point of intersection of such meridian shall follow such meridian with the parallel of south Latitude 0°50' thence proceeding in a south-easterly direction to a point due north of the point on the coast due west of the southernmost of the four islands in the immediate vicinity of Ras Kiambone (Dick's Head); thence due southwards to such point on the coast. The coast shall be defined as the line of mean sea level ordinary spring tides."

It is believed that such a formula will ensure as closely as possible the same plotted course of the Boundary as is intended in Article 1 of the Treaty.
