Sir,

I am directed by Mr. Secretary Chamberlain to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Amery that, as suggested in your letter No. 28436/1925 of July 17th, a conference was held in this department on the 30th June attended by Sir Edward Grigg, Governor of Kenya Colony, Sir Geoffrey Archer, Colonel Harrington, Inspector General of the King's African Rifles, in addition to members of the Colonial Office and of the Sudan Government, to consider what action could be taken to restrain the activities of raiders across the Sudan-Kenya frontier west of Lake Rudolf.

2. After Colonel Harrington had explained the position and the intention of the Kenya Government to establish a permanent post on the neighbourhood of Lake Rudolf it was agreed that a patrol from this post should move both northwards towards Lorusis and westwards to a point which it was reflected somewhere in the neighbourhood of Magila. Subsequently Sir Geoffrey Archer undertook to examine the possibility of making a British defence force post at Igaro to the west of Lake Rudolf and to arrange for a detachment from this post to patrol the areas into Kenya territory so as to maintain a active touch with the Kenya force patrolling towards Morale.

3. It was generally agreed that the delimitation of the Abyssinian frontier north of Lake Rudolf would be ineffective until the British authorities were in a position

position to occupy territory up to the frontier was
delimited.

4. Copies of this Order have been sent to
the Acting Military Commissioner in Egypt for
ratification by the Sudan Government, and to the Sultan
of Khartoum for his signature.

Confidential despatch of the 6th of July, I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy of correspondence with the Foreign Office regarding the situation resulting from the recent raids by Sudan tribes into Kenya, and generally the position of affairs on the Sudan Kenya frontier.

1. It shall be the duty of the military authorities to take such steps as may be necessary to prevent further raids by the Tukana area tribes into Kenya, and generally to maintain order and tranquillity in the frontier districts.
