In his reply Major Grogan wrote. 53735/23  
<sup>(16/11/23)</sup>

"The prices quoted in my letter to Sir  
Herbert Read of the 26<sup>th</sup> September  
were for the areas concerned free of  
all mortgages by both parties and  
not rents other than the affidavits  
and not payable to the above  
named Habs. subject to the lease  
of Afric Wharfage Company  
at the benefit of the same."

After a long time at the  
negotiations were resumed

on 24/11/23 a telegram from the  
Government stated "Legal Advice is  
advised that Grogan and Kibbin's  
Company can give clear title  
subject to their reserving all  
rents and charges which they

have agreed to do."

On 26<sup>th</sup> June 1924 Major Grogan informed  
the Government that the terms offered in  
his letter of 26<sup>th</sup> September 1923 still stood.

In this office on 5/8/24 Major  
Grogan wrote that the offer still stood to  
29057/24 viz "£250,000 for the entire  
holding of the Kibbin's H.W. & E.G. Ltd  
including Grogan's present landlord  
position but subject to the Afric  
Wharfage Co. lease and the lease of 5  
plots on Afric Wharf and the  
cession of Grogan's present lease to a  
99 years lease of the areas under the said  
lease at the rentals provided for in  
the lease."

On 8<sup>th</sup> September Major Grogan was  
sent a letter from the Co. saying inter  
alia: "as the port of Mysore is not  
prepared to purchase a lease area then

the whole of the Mbaraki estate  
(b) The Govt. of Kenya is willing to  
conclude the purchase of the whole  
estate at £400,000 which it is  
understood is the minimum price  
which your Company would be prepared  
to accept for it.

Major Grover could not accept  
that refusal of the Govt. to purchase,  
although negotiations had begun  
by saying he does not want to  
sell. He replied in a letter of 4<sup>th</sup> Sept.  
42051/4  
saying that a reasonable offer shall  
be made to his Company for the  
whole estate. After consulting the  
Govt. a fresh offer was made  
to Major Grover on 1<sup>st</sup> December 1924  
for the purchase of the whole of  
the Mbaraki estate of your Company  
on Mombasa Island at the price of  
£300,000. This offer is made

not; and in particular if your  
Company obtaining an undertaking from  
the African Wharfage Company, Ltd.,  
to waive conditionally its option  
to purchase the existing wharf at  
Mbaraki or any portion of the estate.

Major Grover did not think him  
enough, and in a memo submitted by  
him on 8<sup>th</sup> December 1924 prior to his  
interview with the T.G.C. he wrote:

"A sale now at £400,000 is bad  
business. The estate is already earning  
1%, not a 1% more will virtually  
double his profit in hand. --- That he can  
not improve in all the conditions  
affecting myself, the Company and the  
port since the offer at £300,000 was  
18 months ago."

Subsequent conference is with James

With reference to your letter 50670/34 of December 1st.  
1924: the phrasing, read without knowledge of the antecedent  
negotiations, is ambiguous.

I have interpreted the expression "free of encumbrances  
of every sort" to mean that the purchase price shall include  
the acquisition of my personal interest in the lands leased to  
the Company which interest is of course quite distinct from  
the "estate" of the Company.

The question has been raised in the course of business  
and I shall be grateful if you will write to confirm my  
interpretation as above.
