 In two Estimates, one for 1925/26 and one for 1926/27, we can estimate the cost of the services of Captain Ernest Erskine, as political officer, in the former service in the Commission, in respect of his salary, his expenses as officer, in longer serving at the Commission, in respect of his wireless equipment. For the full year 1925/26 he gives a figure of £2,365 - the Kenya liability for local personnel.

Included in the Imperial Estimate will be found the pay of outfit allowance £525 and £40 respectively of Capt. Erskine, serving as political officer and interpreter in India. The pay of this officer's employment was to be determined by the Governor's appointment. It has been decided that this decision has been removed so that no officer should remain as Imperial employee.

Captain Erskine is no longer in the employment

of Kenya and therefore it would not appear that his salary and expenses should be borne by the Colony. In 1908 the Acting Governor suggested for consideration that the pay of the wireless operator, as well as all additional allowances should be an Imperial liability. I am not so sure that there is good ground in this case again that of the Political Officer. It must of course be remembered that Kenya deserves every consideration as the Boundary Commission is the result of the Treaty given by the Imperial Government for settling the claim of its territory without payment of money and only in kind.

It is true that like the Sudan, Kenya has been used in the past year. I have no objection to the liability for the actual services rendered.

It is to be noted that of Colonel King's allowances the Local Transport were not found in the Estimates. The allowances of British personnel were excluded as incurred in this country and not in the service of him, and there is a clear error of £ 50 for £ 83 under Local Transport, pay and fee for slaves. Nothing was included by him for our insurance liability in respect of the non-commissioned officers.

An estimate has been compiled here under the proper classification, partly from Colonel King's data as well as from our own records. The figure for the current year amounts to £12,000 which is £6,000 in excess of the provision on the Estimates. For 1926-27 the figure we reach is £15,300 as against a sum of £15,500 included provisionally in the draft Colonial Services Estimate. That figure, however, as well be seen from Mr. Seal's minute on 45006 should

should have been £15,500.

We are not in a position here to offer much criticism on the items classified under Stores and Local Transport, in the latter there may have been considerable rounding, and possibly also in the amount included under Miscellaneous for postage and telegrams. Having regard, however, to former boundary commissions in Africa, the amounts of £12,000 and £15,000 do not strike me as excessive. The two amounts do not represent all the expenditure as I see that the Commission is not expected to finish its work before the summer of 1927, after which, I suppose, there will be leave for the personnel.

If you agree that Captain Erskine's pay, etc. should be allowed for in the Boundary Commission Subhead and that Kenya must pay for Mr. Hope, the K.A.R. escort and the wireless operator, the draft Estimates prepared by us can be put to the Treasury with a recommendation for the inclusion of £15,300 for next year and an explanation that so far as concerns the additional £6,000 required for this year, the Secretary of State is not yet in a position to say how much of it, if any, it may be possible to find from savings on other subheads in the Colonial Services Vote.

Sir,

I have the honour to forward herewith my estimates of the cost of the Jubaland Boundary Commission for the years 1925/26 and 1926/27, the former estimate replacing that forwarded with my despatch of Aug. 24th. These estimates are in qualification of my figures in cablegram No. 457 of 15 Oct. 10th addressed to you by the Governor of Kenya Colony, and in apportioning the responsibility as between the Imperial Government and the Colony, I have been guided by your despatch No. 804 of July 2nd, a copy of which was forwarded to me.

2. I have included in the estimate for 1925/26 expenses incidental to the cession of Jubaland and to the subsequent activities of the Political Commission.

3. At my request Capt Erskine was detailed to assist me as interpreter in Italian, and as it appeared to me that his experience of Jubaland made him eminently suitable for the post of Political Officer to the Boundary Commission, I applied for his services in this capacity and my request was granted. I now find that this officer is no longer a servant of the Colony, and that no other Political Officer could be spared to assist me. I have therefore computed what I consider to be a salary commensurate with the value of this officer to me, and have included it in my estimates as a charge against Imperial funds. I propose to offer these terms to Capt. Erskine pending your sanction, and trust that you will recognise such payments as I may make to him in anticipation of your instructions. I should add that Capt. Erskine's services have proved invaluable to me, as he has a complete knowledge of the local political situation and has had considerable experience of the regulation of camel transport and water supply.

4. I regret that the estimates for Local Transport should be so heavy. My base at Wajir is distant 450 miles from Nairobi, and I have been compelled to use hired motor transport for the movement of heavy stores and supplies, as all available ox-transport was already engaged in connection with the change of administration in the Northern Frontier Province. I will make every endeavour to effect a saving on my figure for transport in 1926/27.

5. I anticipate that towards the end of 1926 I shall have completed all the work possible from Wajir base, and I will then change my base to Kiunza, near Dick's Head. I have made provision in my estimate for this movement.

6. In consultation with Lt.Col.Dotto, I anticipate that the work of boundary survey and demarcation should be completed in the early summer of 1927.

7. A copy of this despatch and of my estimates have been passed to the Colonial Administration.

With reference to the concluding paragraph of Sir George Barstow's letter, dated 17th June 1925, S.25637, and to connected correspondence in regard to the British section of the Anglo-Italian (Jubaland) Boundary Commission, I am directed by Mr. Secretary Amery to transmit to you, to be laid before the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, a copy of a letter which has been received from Lt. Col. King, the Senior British Commissioner, submitting an estimate of the expenditure for the British section in the year 1925-26 and the year 1926-27. The estimate referred to by Col. King in his opening paragraph was subsequently cancelled by telegram. The estimates now submitted by him reach a total of £11,893 for the present year and £15,171 for next year, while Col. King does not expect that the work of the Commission is likely to be concluded in Africa until the early summer of 1927. The <sup>last but one</sup> estimates sent home were incomplete in some particulars.

particulars and I am now to enclose a detailed and classified estimate for each of the two years, which has been compiled in this Department.

The total arrived at for the current financial year is £12,000, while that for next year is £15,300. If ~~any sum~~ that is added a sum of £7,700 in respect of the cost of the Commission in 1927, a total of £35,000 is reached, and having regard to the cost of former commissions in Africa in pre-war days where the duration of the work lasted over two years, this total is not, in all the circumstances, regarded as excessive.

The rates of pay for the two Boundary Commissioners and for the Non-Commissioned Officer have already received Their Lordships' sanction, but the provision included for a Political Officer and Interpreter in Italian has not previously been submitted for sanction. Captain Erskine, the officer in question, has now no connection with Kenya, and the salary proposed to him, £100 per annum, is not unreasonable. What they will be liable to receive by their Lordships' sanction will be the employment of this officer at the rate specified and for the ~~make~~ payment to him of an outfit allowance of £40.

The pay of the local subordinate staff is no doubt governed by local rates. The Interpreters are being paid at £1.14.6. a month, so all officers at 30/- a month and labourers 21/- a month, while the horses engaged in connection with local transport animals will cost 30/- a month each for pay and food.

The estimated expenditure on local transport is undoubtedly heavy, but T.L. will see that it does not purchase of camels and mules which it is expected

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expected may ultimately be disposed of to advantage, and having regard to the distance between the base and the sphere of operations of the Commission the expenditure must necessarily be high.

Coming now to local personnel, Mr. Avery is of opinion that Kenya may be asked to bear the normal charges for Mr. Hope, formerly attached to the Commission as Political Officer, [ ] the K.A.R. escort and for the pay of Mr. Kane, Wireless Operator, amounting in all for this year [ ] and next year to £2,385 but that the extraordinary expenditure involved in their attachment to the Commission should be met from Commission funds.

With these explanations I am to ask if Their Lordships may be moved to agree to the inclusion of a sum of £15,300 in the ~~left of~~ Colonial Services Estimate for 1923 now before them ~~in place of the provisional sum of £16,500,~~ and to sanction the estimate for £13,000 for the current year. As regards the excess of £6,000 over the voted provision for Boundary Commissions for the current year, the S. of C. is not yet in a position to say how much of it, if any, it may be possible to find from savings on other headings of the Colonial Services Vote, but on this point a further communication will be addressed to the Treasury in due course.

I enclose with reference to the despatch which was addressed to the Col. Kenya on the 2nd July 1922, a copy of which accompanied the letter from the Office of the Comptroller, dated 8th July 1922, that, in a despatch of the 20th October, 1921, Kenya was again advised to submit, and, as far as my knowledge before the date of despatch now, complete information in the shape of financial statement of what Kenya might fairly claim the colonial authorities to pay her in respect of the debt for the years 1920-21 and 1921-22, and that the same would be taken into account in the final settlement of the accounts for the year 1922-23, a fact being affected in the wages of the members of the Commission who were attached to the
