seen to be any general conviction of what should be equally obvious, that it is hopeless to try to prepare a scheme suited to native mentality unless the body responsible for the scheme has a real knowledge, not only of native habit and custom, but also of native modes of thought. My Council believes that the only way for the responsible body to attain this knowledge is for it to have among its members an Anthropologist who has gained his knowledge of natives by actual field work in the continent concerned, for experience suggests that there are very considerable differences of outlook and of mental development between the various groups of black men.

Apart from its opinion on these two points upon which my Council has asked me to write to you, it asks me to state that, if so desired, it would always be ready to arrange for one or its two members who have a first hand knowledge of African tribes, to discuss any matter with you, either officially or unofficially as you might wish, and it believes that the knowledge and opinions thus placed at your disposition might be of special value to this or any other Committee dealing with matters affecting the native populations.
