Sir,

I have the honour to ask whether the Government would be so kind as to defray the expense of a brief visit on my part to Brussels and at any rate if M. Araban is at home, to Paris. These visits would be of great use in placing me au courant with what is being done in regard to the problem in French and Belgian Africa. A visit to Lisbon, if I can fit it also into my time, might or might not be of use in this connection and might ostensibly be made for this purpose, but it would perhaps be of the very greatest use in relation to future border co-operation for the control of testse. I would expect this object to be served also by my visit to Brassels.

Border Plans

I hope at some time during my next tour in Africa to commence a study of Lake Tanganyika in order to see whether it may not be possible a little later to attack the palpalis problem of that Lake with the co-operation of the Belgian authorities.

I shall also, at an early date - when I station one of the new Reclamation Officers in Twisdurn investigate the tastse problem of the Rovuma country. This problem cannot be understood or properly dealt with without a detailed knowledge of the position on the Pertuguese side of the border.

I shall need, definitely, to visit both Belgian and Portuguese Territory and, thereafter, to keep in touch with both. This necessity for keeping in touch with what is happening advess one's borders is well illustrated by the serious invasion (by tsetse) of Nyasaland from Northern Rhodesia, and of Ankole from the Bukoba direction and I propose to make it a part of my work. I shall also wish, at some time, perhaps

during local leave, to go into the Congo country with a view to adding to my knowledge on an important subject - the relation of the various testos-species to the various African woodland formations, and, on the Rovama, I have also the further problem of putting an end to the possing of elephants which takes place from the Portuguese side of the border.

Smoores in the above programme depends entirely on whether I can obtain the co-operation of the authorities sorose the border and, naturally, when the time nomes, H.R. the Governor, if he approves of my oressing the border, would request the necessary assistance from the Government of the territory concerned. I have, however, actual reason to believe that official action alone may not be effective in precessing me this in any sufficient degree and that I shall be more successful if I can reinferce it through having got into personal touch with inflmential scientific men, interested in the problem, in the respective complicate, who could help ne with private letters of introduction. Unofficially, I could probably turn visits to Brussels and Liebon, or, failing the latter, an interset in the matter by the Mosambique Company's Landon Committee, to excellent account in this connection.

I take this opportunity to add a point of a wider nature. It is that it is vital to induce the Portuguese, whose fly-infested territories border so many of our colonies, to take an adequate part, if possible (for the sake of uniformity and effectiveness where they themselves have no expert on the spot) under our guidance or suggestion, in any campaign against the fly which may be undertaken for the protection of these colonies. The situation of the kind that I am personally best acquainted with is in Southern Rhodesia, where the very serious effects of the fly are being felt entirely on the
