

(I am sorry there has been so Alich delay in sending on this paper, but it has been held up pending the general action on the report of the proceedings of the Governors' Conference. That taken action has been on X.3212/26 Bast Arrive, which has been in more or less constant circulation).

As regards hand and Labour Policy, the general replies of the Governors assume that memorands will be submitted for the Secretary of State's consideration in dua course. In the case of Imagenyika the memorandum has already been approved on Gov. X. 4561 Tang.

I spoke to you some time ago in regard to this paper, and I now suggest that it should be answered on the following lines:

? refer to the Confidential despatch of the 21st August on X. 3212/26 in which the Secretary of state has assumed that memorated relating to the Land and Labour Policy would be submitted for his consideration in due course; and as Sir E. Griggs states that he and the Governor of Tanganyika have been in com unication with regard to such instruction mention that the Tanganyika draft has been agreed to with slight alteration; say that the Secretary of State is impressed with the importance of furnishing district officers with authoritative and precise suffered as to the policy of the Government in regard to such matters, and that it was for this reason, and in order to assure the greatest measure of uniformity that may be possible having regard to varying o conditions, that he had continuented the desue,

subject to his approval, of specific instructions in each Dependency. Also say that the Secretary of State still thinks that this procedure would be the best in the circumstances; but of the Governor, on further consideration, is satisfied that the memorandum approved by the Governor's Confedence would afford, in spite of its more or less general terms, sufficient detailed guidance for the district officers in the exercise of their every day duties, the Secretary of State will not press for the issue of separate and more detailed instructions in Kenya at the present time.

Sir

I have the honour to refer to Sir Donald Cameron's despatch, Confidential, dated 29th April, 1926, on the subject of the issue of draft instructions for the guidence of Administrative Officers in realing with the question of Native Labour, a subject, which, as you are aware, was discussed at length at the Governors' Conference, the recommendations of the Conference having been forwarded to you in Governors' Conference letter No.7, dated 23rd.March, 1926.

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- 2. In accordance with conclusion 3 of the recommendations of the Governors' Conference on this subject, Sir Donald Cameron and I have been in communication with regard to the special instructions on Land and Labour policy which should be issued to Administrative Officers in our respective territories and the instructions which Sir Donald Cameron has now forwarded to you have been altered in some respects from his original draft instructions, which he kindly forwarded for my suggestions, to meet certain remarks put forward by me on the question of native production.
- In so far as the Colony of Kenys is conserned, after careful consideration, I am of opinion that it is at present insavisable to issue any draft instructions on the question

Lieutement Colonel L.C.M.S.Amery, P.C., H.P., Secretary of State for the Colonies, Downing Street, London, S.W. of Native Labour to Administrative Officers and I consider that in the first instance the Memorandum on Landsand Labour Policy in the East African Territories, which was approved at the recent Governors' Conference, whould, if approved by you, be sufficient guide for Americantive Officers in Lenys; If, in practice, it is found that Administrative Officers require some further guidance, I shall then, in communication with His Excellency the Governor of Tanganyiks prepare draft instructions.

1. I would therefore request that early instructions may be issued by you with regard to the conclusions of the Governors' Conference on the question of Land and

Labour Policy, so that appropriate action may be taken

in this territory.
