I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt
of your Despatch No. 1147 of the 15th of December and
to inform you that I approve of the present system,
whereby 30 days or more of the final month of an
officer's tour of service may be counted for leave
accruing as a full month, being retained for another
year.

2. The Governor of Tanganyika Territory has, however, suggested that, instead of extending the present arrangements indefinitely it would be more satisfactory for the East African Dependencies to adopt the system in force in East Africa and provided for in Colonial Regulation No. 122, whereby any extra fraction of a month served by an officer on one tour may be credited.
