In the circumstances I suggested to him that it was an inopportune time to raise the question of increasing the remuneration of other members of the board. 

With reference to C.O.Lr.X.4101/26 of the 12th May, 1926, regarding the allowances to be made to East African officials owing to unavoidable detention in the United Kingdom, will you please say how the instructions are to be applied in the case of Dr. A. F. Wallace, Medical Officer, Northern Rhodesia, who, you will find, was granted an extension of leave to 28th April, 1926, on full salary, and thereafter to 6th May, 1926, without salary, on the ground of private affairs. He was due to sail on the 7th May, but, owing to the Strike and consequent travelling difficulties in proceeding from Aberdeen to Southampton, he was unable to embark on a steamer sailing before the 21st May. His passage has been transferred to the s.s. "KENILWORTH CASTLE", sailing on the 21st May, 1926, and we conclude that he will duly embark in this steamer.

There is a further case - that of Mr. G. C.
