ADMINISTRATIVE CIVIL SERVICE.

Panda comments on points raised by G.O.
in despatch of 26th April.

MINUTES

This despatch makes very bad reading. It is almost incredible that my Govt. has treated a number of deserving employees in the way the Kenya govt. has treated its African graded clerks. It is necessary to consider the despatch for paragraph by paragraph.

Parag. 2. This admits the African clerks main contention. Due to Sir Alfred Lavelle's own recommendations there were no social distinctions in the Kenya non-European staff: African and Asian worked side by side, and the capable African had the same pay, pension etc. rights as the Asian in the same grade of the service.

that African grades 1 & 2 were given lower bonuses than Asians automatically placed them junior to Asians who had previously been their juniors.

5. Although I realize that this arrangement operated harshly in the case of African clerks who were in the service when the readjustment of salaries was carried out, I think the principle introduced by Sir Alfred Lascelles is sound and it is regrettable that this distinction between Government servants locally recruited and overseas appointees, was not made clear in the title of Secretariat Circular No.49 of the 15th August, 1920. The designation 'Non European' in the circumstances is ambiguous and it is a fact that difficulty has been experienced in adjusting the letter of this Circular to the spirit of the recommendations which it purported to implement, and it was found necessary in practice to modify the terms of paragraph 4 of that Circular which does not apply to Africans.

6. With regard to paragraph 4 of your despatch under reply African clerks in the Non-European Civil Service are certainly entitled to the privileges of that service. No sort of compulsion shall be put on these clerks to transfer to the proposed Native Civil Service. It should be mentioned in passing that all Asians who were graded in the Non-European Staff were regraded in accordance with the provisions of Secretariat Circular No.55 of 31st August, 1920, so that the Staff Non-European staff now consists of those Africans who could not be so treated. Their privileges are not identical with those formerly enjoyed by Asians in the Non-European service owing

no Circular so limiting the privileges of the
Non European Staff in the case of those
domiciled in the Colony was issued, the grounds
for refusing such privileges when applied for
have invariably been explained to the applicants.

Declarations from the Acting Civil Service on the amount
of fees which are allowed to retain for his own use in the
period preceding the retirement. It will be the duty of the Colony
themselves or the accuracy of such statements.

In the case of Officers receiving Fixed Salaries, the
circumstances be allowed to count for Periods in part
Salaries, and fees will not in any case be allowed

HEAD 8.—In cases of infirmity, if the applicant is below the ordinary age for retirement, a Medical Certificate is to be furnished showing that he is disabled by infirmity of mind or body for dis-
charge of his function, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent.

In case of ten years' service or more, this certificate should be signed by two persons,
whom at least one should, if possible, be a Subordinate Officer of the Government.

HEAD 9.—As to "broken" service see HEAD 5.

If the applicant has had any "acting" service, the details must be fully given, with a statement whether or not, during the "acting" service, he was connected with the permanent Civil Service of the Colony.

HEAD 11.—If, in special circumstances, a professional Civil Officer has been allowed to have "private practice" without forfeiting his claim to Pension, the facts are to be fully stated.

HEAD 14.—If the Applicant is liable to any deduction from his service under Clause 102 of the Colonial Regulations, the facts should be fully stated.

HEAD 19.—The length of service and other particulars of the computation are to be given. When an average
of Salary, &c., is taken, the mode of calculating it (whether by months, &c.) is to be explained.

limiting liability to the
amount of one year's salary
applies in the light of treasury rules,
does not allow of more
than the average being given
in a case in which an officer,
had he been pensionable,
