I have the honour to refer to my despatch No. 724 of 31st May, on the subject of the petition from British Ex-Soldiers who were unsuccessful in the lottery for farms under the Settlement Scheme in 1919, and to forward herewith a petition from twenty three alien Ex-Soldiers who were not eligible to participate in that lottery.

2. The reasons given in that despatch for my inability to recommend the earlier petition apply with equal force to the present memorial, and I am not disposed in the circumstances favourably to consider the representations made by persons, whose claims were not contemplated in the original scheme.

3. With regard to the statement in the covering letter from Messrs. Shapley and Schwartz to the effect that the petitioners have approached the local Government, I am advised that there is no record of a concerted application in the terms of the petition having been made nor indeed of any individual application.

Sir,

Re. Aliens who served in the Great War.

We, the undersigned persons who are all of alien birth and are now residing in the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, beg to present our humble petition to you as follows:-

At the out-break of the Great War, when the call was made for volunteers to protect the Empire in its hour of need, we responded to the call alongside of the many others who joined up, and were, of course, largely citizens of the British Empire.

We set out our names and records of service below for your information and same can be substantiated by reference to the Official Records.

Soldiers who served in the Great War and were British Subjects (and in some cases, we think, are not) were given an opportunity to acquire land in this Colony under the Soldier Settlement Scheme and as a result of this arrangement, many of our men have received grants of land and we would like to point in this connection, we would venture to point out that the original purchase price which was to be charged for what were termed "B" farms was reduced and is in practice remitted on the necessary developments being completed, whilst the "A" or smaller farms were allotted free of purchase price.

We have represented our case, to the best of our ability, to the local Government with a view to obtaining grants of land on similar terms to those granted to other British soldiers who were not of alien origin, but we have been told that nothing can be done for us in the matter of such grants or indeed in any other way.

We are all of us settled in this country and earning our living here and we all expect to remain here permanently and make this country our home, and we therefore venture to lay our humble petition before you for your favourable consideration on the broad and general principle that we were considered good enough to be allowed to fight for the British Empire, we should be conceded similar privileges to those granted to the others of our fellow soldiers and that a dividing line should not be drawn against us because we happen to be of alien origin.

We would point out that most, if not all, of us would have become naturalized British Subjects by this time but for the intervention of the War and the consequent difficulties which were imposed thereby, and as a matter of fact it has not been possible for us to become British Subjects by naturalization or we should have assuredly done so.

We have proved our willingness to defend the country we live in and should be ready to do so again if the need should arise, and, in this connection, we would venture to draw attention to the fact that

foreign subjects, as for instance in French Morocco, have formed a Foreign Legion for emergency service, and this we would be prepared to do if thought desirable, but probably, in view of our number, Government would prefer to utilise our services in the Defence Force.

There are not a great number of us but we believe we can honestly claim to have done our duty and would leave our case in your hands with a view to the matter being fully considered and some recognition made to us, preferably in the right to acquire land, in accordance with the principles of British justice which we take it will be extended to all those who fought for the British Empire in the Great War.
