Sir,

I am directed by Mr. Secretary Ramsay MacDonald to inform you that as a result of recent correspondence between himself and the Italian Prime Minister, he has signified his readiness at once to conclude the arrangement regarding Jubaland provisionally reached between Lord Milner and Signor Scioleja in the spring of 1920.

2. The Italian Government have accordingly despatched to London three experts who are to represent them in the negotiations for the conclusion of a final convention. The names of these experts are given in the enclosed telegram from His Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires in Rome, and it will be observed that they should arrive in London on Thursday next.

3. The Secretary of State is of opinion that these negotiations would more suitably be conducted by the Colonial Office and he would be obliged if, subject to the concurrence of Mr. Secretary Thomas, arrangements could be made accordingly. Mr. Ramsay MacDonald has meanwhile instructed the Honourable Harold Nicolson, C.M.G., of this department to place himself in communication with you and to represent the Foreign Office at all the discussions which will take place.


