The Resolutions which the
D.O. refer are 1(a) & 1(b)
on page 13 of the accompanying
Brief Cnd. 1887. And
the other broad points not
(as were his historical

to Rome of the 15th October 1923 when the D.O.'s had written (30/4/23)
I understand that the
Draft Convention merely carries out
the settlement previously contemplated
& all that has happened is that
the Italian question has been
settled independently & not as
part of a settlement concerning
other questions

I reply that the S. G. P.
did not think it necessary to
convene the D.O. Council as to the
Convention, as he was satisfied
that no Italian interests
were involved and that others of
the left Powers as indicated

the D.O.'s have also been
sent copies of the P.M.'s despatch
to Rome of the 3rd March (18/3/23)
and 20th May (25/5/23)



Sir,

In connection with the draft convention providing for the cession of Jubaland, as initialled by the British and Italian experts at the Colonial Office on the 7th instant, I am directed by Mr. Secretary Ramsay MacDonald to refer to the resolutions passed by the Imperial Conference in 1923, relative to the negotiation, signature and ratification of treaties affecting the British Empire, and to request that he may receive an assurance from Mr. Secretary Thomas that the recommendations of the conference have in this case been fulfilled. Mr. Ramsay MacDonald is anxious to satisfy himself that all formalities as regards the Dominions have been executed before he advises His Majesty The King to ratify the convention.

2. Mr. Ramsay MacDonald is at the same time causing a letter to be addressed to the India Office, informing them that the convention has been drafted and initialled, and requesting that they shall take steps to advise the Government of India, in conformity with the resolutions of the Imperial Conference.
