- 2. The suggestion is now being made to the Joinnial Office that, in the event of a boundary commission being set up for the above purposes, its scope should be extended to include the delimitation of the Abyssinia-Kenya frontier, in the heighbourhood of Lake models.

I am directed by Mr. Secretary Ransay Loopont a to transmit to you, to be laid before Mr. Secretary Thomas, the accompanying copy of a despatch from his Majesty's Chergé d'Affaires at Addis Ababa, relative to a raid into critish territory west of Lake hunclings at arred arty of Abyssinians.

In the course of a interview with has Tariari on July, 11th, the Secretary of State took the opportunity of raising with him the whole question of abyssinian raids into British territory, giving details of recent raids into the Rulan, Kenya and Someliland. The discussion on that complion turned mainly upon the raids into the Sudan, which had been more frequent than those into other territories, and has Taffari, while protesting that such incursions by 1.001 chieftoins were slapps published by the Central government, explained that he could not lismiss important governors under whom the minor chieft the staveurless complicity of the governor sould be proved. ...as Tafteri compleined that it was difficult to ascerter. whether violations of the frontier reall, occur. e. recause it had not seen properly delimited (presumetly his itser). - At a further interview with the Secretary of State on Fully 16th Ras Teffart stated that according to the treaty with the British Government the frontier was shown on the map by a red line but the treaty provided that it should be delimited on the ground by a joint Anglo-Abyssinian Commission and clearly marked by beacons. This had not yet been done along the whole frontier. Ir. Hamsay MacDonald, in reply, agreed that delimitation was desirable, and promised to make no difficulty about it. He expressed the hope, however, that when the British members of the commission arrived at the frontier the Abyssinian members would be there to meet them, and would not fail to turn up as had happened on previous occesions. He also hoped that the Abyssinian commissioners would have authority to settle questions relative to the boundary on the spot
- 4. A despatch was accordingly addressed to his majesty's High Commissioner at Cairo on Fully 22rd, requesting him to aggertain whether the Sudan would be ready to undertake the tesk of demarcating the frontier, where this had not already been done, and if so, which portion of the frontier, should, in their opinion, he the first to be deligited.
- 5. Mr. Thomas will observe that incertainty regarding the exact frontier line is now being used as an excuse by the local Abyssidish suthorities for raise in the neighbourhood of Lake Rudolf, and I am to suggest, for his consideration, that in the event of a boundary to lesson being appointed to demarcate the portion of frontier referred

to in paragraph 3 above, the opportunity might be taken of delimiting at the same time the frontier between Kenya and Abyssinia in the neighbourhood of Lake Rudolf. I am therefore to ask that Mr. Kamsay MacDonald may be furnished with such observations on this matter as Mr. Thomas may desire to offer.

I have the honour to state that on August 6th I received despatches from his hajesty's Consul at heli stating that a serious raid had been made by Abyssinians from his district in British territory west of Lake Rudolf, and also that the local authorities were considerably exercised about all ged activities of British officers well thin British territory.

The following is an entract from a report by the Officer Commanding Troops, Kenys, Hakuma, Tutkane, May, 6th 1924, Conwarded to me by Mr. Consul Holeon.

Demake the honour to inform Your Rajesty that during the early part of this year officers of Fitaurari Mashesha with about 150 rifles made a raid in British territory to the West of Loke Rudolf and carried off many thousand heads of eattle. The principal officers concerned were Kenyammatch Voldeyes, Gerazmetch Andarge, Lij Rada, Ato Demaka and Gabra-Giorgis. Lenyazmatch Nade died during the raid.

I am aware that Your Hajesty wishes to preserve the friendly relations which at present exist retween Abyesimis and the Aritish Empire. I consequently nope that Your Majesty will cause the most vigorous measures to be taken to prevent and punish outrages of this description.

I should like to be able to persuade Your Majesty that 113 if these acts of officials in the provinces are not punished in an exemplary way, they are bound to occur again, either under the same officers and Governors or under their successors. And Your Majesty 1 am sure realises that two neighbouring nations cannot remain for ever on friendly terms, when the subjects of one nation are allowed to make raids on the other without receiving adequate punishment.
