Lord Southborough when he called

it, was that the Clearing Office were about
to issue a writ. We undertook to expedite
the despatch of the general letter on the
question of the reconstruction, and it was
sent off the same day. After Lord
Southborough had gone, we consulted Mr. Dixon
and found that there was no convenient means
of semi-official communication with the
Clearing Office on this subject. We then
searched our memories and concluded that
we had made no commitments to Lord Southborough
on this point.

prevent this move of the Clearing Office having a bad effect on the reconstruction and probably to induce the Court (if the writ issues) to give the reconstruction a chance.

If Mr. Busne agrees, however, we might communicate officially with the Clearing Office, explain the position and say they will no doubt be prepared to accept the attitude of the Colonial Government in assisting the reconstruction of the Company as evidence that that is the best course in the interests of all parties.

If we do so we should simply tell Messrs. Waltons that we are in communication with the Clearing Office and say that ~~we~~ ^{will} ~~are~~ agree with Lord Southborough that in the circumstances explained the correspondence regarding reconstruction must be passed forward and while the question of approaching the Clearing Office semiofficially was ^{but not} considered with him, it is not in the recollection of officers of the Dept. that any undertaking on this line ^{was} given.

Mr. Alcock came over from the Clearing Office this morning & saw Mr. Read & Mr. Busne & me. A fresh point that emerged was that the Island Revenue are also a creditor of the Company (Tax on debenture interest - £18000) but that they have agreed to take 75% of the amount in preference shares of the new Company.

We appealed to Mr. Alcock's better feelings and also Mr. Busne (Moral) self-interest: the Clearing Office, being quite unsecured, have no earthly chance of getting any thing out of the wreck, & I think we moved him; but Mr. Busne said this afternoon that the Clearing Office have decided to proceed to wind up the property.

We have done what we could, & we have, incidentally, made it clear that, if the Company breaks up, we shall do every thing we can to put the Govt. of Kenya in the best possible position.

The amount involved is £18000 & the principal & accrued interest, £19000.

It was suggested to Mr. Brash


