I am sorry that at a time of great pressure I have not been able to send this forward before. The promised despatch has not come, but subject to anything that it may contain I make the following observations:-

Of the original services proposed for this £1,500,000 Loan in Gov 31192/24, two (Floating Debt £200,000, and Railway Unallocated Stores £302,347) were cut out altogether. The sanction was withheld to the Unallocated item of £582,000, pending definite information as to what was proposed. The remaining items were approved, except that ^{under} Mombasa Town Planning we considered that £50,000 should definitely be set aside for future improvements in the old town of Mombasa. but a sufficiently definite pledge is given that the money will be forthcoming.

The net result is to increase our £465,000 to £474,000, and I think that £500,000 ^{may} ~~should~~ well cover the whole. Nothing is said as to the Unallocated item, and we may ^{assume} ~~presume~~ from their paring down of "D" and "E"(2) that they have given up the idea of further Loan Services at present.

There can be no question, I presume, of the ^{actual issue} acquisition of the loan until the report of the East African Commission has been ^{submitted} ~~received~~, and decisions have been taken on the recommendations for capital services, other than transport, which it will contain. Pending issue the services will have to be financed as best they can, as will also the transport services as soon as we have exhausted the proceeds of the £3,500,000 Assisted Loan, which are at present being used both for the services covered by that Loan, and for those to be covered by the impending £3,000,000 Transport Loan.

In view of our telegram and despatch on 26/13/24 the necessity for telegraphic reply now appears to be in order to cover the two new items of Kisumu and Eldoret Water Supply. We should telegraph approve of all the proposals but so long that it is assumed that the promised despatch which has not yet been received, will contain definite schemes for these two Water Supplies, pointing out that it is most undesirable that works of this kind should be undertaken without most careful working out of plans and estimates.

(We have an object lesson on this point

in the despatch on the Mombasa Water Works in
10386/25, which I send on with this paper.)

I agree. There is no desire to confine the unimproved
loan provision to £500,000. In the Wiseman & Elliot
reference has been in the original programme, the additional
£57,500 would probably have been among the approved
items. It is all clear why they should postpone $\frac{2}{3}$ of the
housing scheme for Africans, and the whole of the Mombasa
Water Provision pending further investigation & report, and
make such conditions in the case of the two new water supply
schemes. But the prices (D & E) are only prepared, and provided
that we shall not be accused of favouring Europeans at the
expense of Africans & Indians there seems no objection.

No.87 25th February. Your telegram of 14th January Loan Expenditure proposals approved by the Legislative Council except amount housing African clerks reduced to £10,000 as first instalment pending report of the Select Committee regarding the type of buildings and £50,000 for the old town of Mombasa to be voted later when the proposal formulates. Council agreed that provision necessary. Ready to approve when detailed plans available. Two items of urgent importance necessity for which long been urged were added to the Schedule (a) £27,500 water supply Kisumu which will continue to be entrepot for all local and Southern Lake traffic even after the completion of the Uganda main line and the urgency intensified at present owing to the large labour forces employed there. Need strongly urged by the medical authorities (b) £30,000 water supply at future railway centre Eldoret. No pipe water supply exists at present and immediate provision is necessary for the rapidly developing needs of the town and railway. There will be a return to Government in water rates on both these schemes. I have also transferring (?transferred) to this Schedule £10,000 for maize drying plant and £15,000 for cold storage Kilindini from transport loan. Request your approval by cable. It is hoped that expenditure on goods purchased in England for these works may receive the benefit of assisted loan for works of public utility. Dispatch follows.
