of reports by the Governors of Kenya and Uganda showing the towns and areas in which it is definitely established that segregation cannot, owing to legal difficulties, be abandoned.

by a request from the India Office for new reports for communication to the Govt. of India (who may have representations to make).

As regards a) the Kenya report is incomplete, as it deals only with Nairobi and Mombasa. The area affected in Nairobi is surprisingly small, that in Mombasa is relatively larger, comprising most of the sea front of the island. In Uganda the areas affected are one portion of Kampala and a limited part of Jinja.

The question is whether we should comply with b) now, or wait

wait for the full Kenya report.

I think it is very unlikely that
the Govt. of India will find anything
in the reports so far in which they
could base representations, & that the
other Frontiers in Kenya will make
a worse showing than Nairobi and
Mombasa. There is some ground in letting
the Govt. of India have information as
we get it, & I would suggest that
we should send the I.O. the
two disputes as they stand (with
duplicate of the Kenya maps) without
comment, for transmission to
the Govt. of India.

Sir,

With reference to Mr. Thomas's despatch No. 1507 of 22nd May, 1924, regarding the abandonment of the policy of racial segregation in townships, and to your telegram of 6th December on the same subject, I have the honour to inform you the whole question has been receiving the careful attention of this Government with a view to varying or restrictive cover of residential areas in all cases where this can be done without risk of involving Government in legal proceedings.

The Commissioner of Lands, in consultation with the Attorney-General, has now completed an examination of all parts of the townships of Mombasa and Nairobi and a classification in the light of the decision conveyed in your telegram of December last. The result proves that in respect of Nairobi the areas in which it is considered that Government must still maintain the restrictions against Asiatic residence are very small, viz., the residential plots in the Anderson Valley, and Bishops Road area, Forest Road and Hurley Road. The business plots in 5th Avenue and the immediate vicinity are open to Asiatic ownership and occupation, but are subject

subject to restriction against Asiatic residence which it is considered cannot be waived.

3. With regard to Mombasa, the area in the residential part of the Island still restricted to European ownership and occupation is somewhat larger in proportion, viz., the greater part of the area bounded by Salim Road, Tritton Road, and the sea front. All other plots within Nairobi and Mombasa townships will be free for unrestricted transfer.

4. Maps have been prepared showing these areas and two copies of each map are being transmitted to you under separate cover.

5. Similar plans are being prepared by the Land Office based on the same classification of plots for all other township areas, and will be sent to you on completion.


