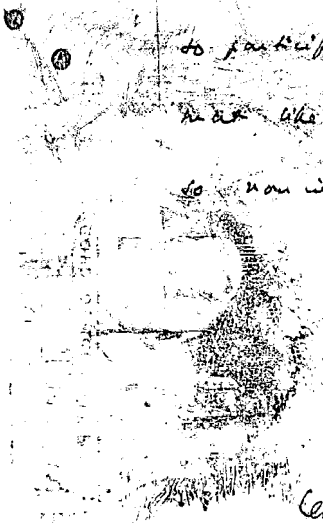

TELEGRAM from the Officer Administering the Government
of the Somaliland Protectorate to the Secretary of
State for the Colonies.

Dated 7th November 1925.

(Received Colonial Office 9.15 p.m. 7th November 1925.)

7th November.

I have received indefinite information from
Heane that other East African Dependencies have
joined the East African Trade and Information Agency,
but that Somaliland is not included. I suggest
tentatively that this Protectorate should take part.
My information is vague and I should be glad to hear
further details. I also suggest for your considera-
tion advisability of this Protectorate being repre-
sented at the Conference of East African Governors
shortly to be held at Nairobi.
