Dear Mr. Batterbee,

I July received two numbers of the "Journal" and the copies of your recent circular on the terms of service for European officials, all of which I have read with great interest. I am very much obliged to you for them. I am returning herewith the copies of the "Journal."

You will be glad to know that after discussing the question, my Executive Council have accepted the view that the new conditions of service are such as would justify an announcement in "The Post" to the effect that members of the Home Service might now freely apply for any vacancies that are announced under the new terms. I propose to make that announcement in an article which will appear in our journal next week.

I will send you in due course a short memorandum of my views on the question of women's employment, and the necessity for machinery that will readily enable ~~the~~ postal workers and other Civil Servants in the Protectorates to make representations to the Government.
