Sir,

I am directed to inform you that, subject to your being passed as physically fit for service, it is proposed to select you for appointment as a Second Class Telegraph Inspector in the Postal and Telegraph Department of the East Africa and Uganda Protectorates, with salary at the rate of £300 per annum, rising by annual increments of £10 to £250 per annum. A war bonus is also payable at present in accordance with the scales shown in the enclosed memorandum.

2. Furnished quarters when available will be provided by the Government for single men free of rent, but not of rates or other smaller outgoings. When such quarters are not available a hut or other temporary shelter is provided, or in certain cases an allowance in lieu of quarters is granted at the discretion of the Government. Free second class passages will be provided to and from East Africa, and a free pass over the Uganda Railway between Mombasa and the place at which you are stationed.

3. A memorandum showing the general conditions attached to appointments in East Africa, and a copy of the laws and orders regulations are enclosed herewith, and you are to understand that you will be

subject to regulations which may be introduced hereafter by, or with the sanction of the Secretary of State. A copy of the regulations as to pensions, and a copy of the Colonial regulations are also enclosed.

4. You will be paid half salary and half bonus as from the date of embarkation for East Africa and full salary, and full bonus as from the date of arrival at Mombasa.

5. You will be seconded in the first instance in the Home Service for a term of thirty months in East Africa, on the incidental thereto, on the understanding that the period of your secondment (including passages and leave as well as the time spent in East Africa) shall not exceed three years. At the end of that period you may either be confirmed in your appointment to the permanent establishment in East Africa, if your services have been satisfactory and are still required by the Government or you may revert to the Home Service. In the former case, you will retain your title to pension in respect of your service at home, calculated separately upon your Home Service and salary in accordance with the provisions of No. 9 of the Rules of the 21st of July, 1911, framed under Section 7 (1) of the Superannuation Act 1909. If, on the other hand, you revert to the Home Service, and ultimately retire from that Service under conditions qualifying you for a pension, you will receive pensions calculated separately in respect of your service in East Africa and your Home Service in the manner explained above.

6. It is necessary that you should understand that you are liable to serve either in the East Africa or Uganda Protectorate, and that you may be transferred from either of these Protectorates to the other according to the requirements of the Government.

7. It will be within the power of the Governor of the Protectorate to determine your appointment at any time within the period of the engagement, should he think fit, granting you a free passage to this country and the leave for which you are qualified by your service in East Africa. In that event you will revert to the Home Service, provided that you are physically fit, and that your official conduct has been satisfactory, at the expiration of your leave or as soon thereafter as there is a vacancy.

8. If you are prepared to accept this offer of appointment, you should present yourself at once to one of the Medical Advisers to this Department, whose names are given on the enclosed letter, for the purpose of being medically examined. The letter is to be left with him, and he will send his report direct to this Department. The fee of one guinea for the examination will be paid by the Government and, if it is necessary for you to make a journey by railway to visit the Medical Adviser you may submit a claim for the refund of the return railway fare (3rd class).

9. I am to request that you will inform me without delay whether you wish to accept the offer

of

of this appointment. You should also state what is the earliest date on which you will be able to leave for East Africa where your services are urgently required.

10. In replying to this letter, if you accept the offer of appointment, you should give the name and address of a relative in this country to whom communications can be sent if necessary in your absence.

11. A copy of Notes for Officers appointed to East Africa and Uganda is enclosed.
