of his appeal to the W.A.M.S. I gather from the special reference to change pay in  $\frac{W.O.}{2862/18}$  that field travelling allowances were not given in the E.A.M.S. I see no reason why the allowances for an military service should not be treated in the same way as those of the E.A.M.S.

4. In agreeing to Army pay allowances, the W.O. expressly excluded war gratuity, and if it is decided to apply the E.A.M.S. treatment to the Wagon H.O.s, they cannot be given gratuity. It may be observed however that Dr. N.M. [eg, Nyarala] has been given a war gratuity as an ex-officio of the Nyarala Field Force (see  $\frac{Rt.}{2893}$ )

5. There seems to be very little in this point, & I suppose the <sup>main</sup> grievance consists in not being allowed to wear uniform during leave, except of course that Army pay and allowances <sup>if granted</sup> would no doubt continue during military leave and also a war gratuity if given, could be based upon a period which would include military leave.

6. This may have been unfair enough at the time, but in view of the long period during which rotations or an allowance leave have been given, I should not like you to serve a general of the ~~disorder~~ in respect of the short period mentioned.

1. No Advance on Salary

(All the J. O. from West Bengal received 10% advance)

2. Allowance in Civil Service in a regular manner

(The officials of all other departments obtained 10% advance)

to receive gratuity in case of their retirement. It was decided

that the J. O. should also receive 10% advance

3. No Advance on Salary

(The reason given being that we were not paid from State funds)

It seems unjust that because the Government agreed

to pay our salaries while we were in Civil Service, we should

be debarred from a gratuity paid to us on our exit.

4. No Charge for

(This may still be under consideration. I could not see any

the subject from G. L. O. We had more work than other J. O. in

my charge under D. P. & no notice was taken of appointments for

additional men. Our advanced cases were filed at intervals of

100 bills, put up for weeks together, never had more than 50

5. No Holiday Leave

(This would have cost nothing as it would have coincided with

our Civil Service. Even after a year or more and now work in

the field and in the office was expected to be resumed after the

leave before they were on leave and were made to start work

on their return.)

6. No Release or Release of Government Officers

(This was sanctioned by the G. L. O. but refused by the

Chief Minister for all time at the time of departure from

the J. O. in April 1948.)

under review the statement which you submitted  
regarding the conditions under which M.O.s in  
the S.A.P. Uganda were employed on active  
service in S.E.A., and to reply as follows to  
the various points raised therein -

Allowance

It has been decided to apply  
to Uganda M.O.s who were employed with the  
military forces the same treatment as  
has been accorded to M.O.s of the S.A.P.  
under similar circumstances. The rank equivalent  
of such officers will be made up to the Army  
pay and allowances appropriate to their  
respective ranks as from the 1st of April 1918;  
and Chap. Pay will be paid to all of the  
pay awarded included in the same

in the assessment of long pay & allowances. These rates  
 are laid down in Article 358 of the Pay Award but they  
 are inclusive of all allowances, except field &  
 travelling allowance. As regards field allowance, the  
 Government Office of the W.A.S.F. does  
 not pay a day in accordance with the provisions of this  
 article. It is the duty of the W.A.S.F. to  
 pay a day in accordance with the provisions of this

 Government Office of the W.A.S.F. to the effect that

2. Service Gratuity

It was decided that there should be a  
 provision for leave as the Home - quarter qualified  
 in most cases on a full basis.

4. National Service Allowance

It was decided that the Government Office of the W.A.S.F. should not be responsible for the payment of National Service Allowance.

The matter is referred to the Board for the month of May 1914.

5. Retirement Savings

It was decided that the Government Office of the W.A.S.F. should not be responsible for the payment of Retirement Savings.
