With reference to para 1 of letter P. 1476/1919 of
December 28th last, I have the honor to report as follows:

1. In the question of the future administrative arrangements in
the Northern Frontier District Northern Transvaal and Northern Natal and
in Northern Rhodesia District Northern Rhodesia and Western Transvaal
2. I propose that the present 3rd Battalion of the King's African
Rifles shall be placed into existence once on a new Compo-
nent basis, having headquarters including a small training dep't
established at Nelspruit in the present Northern Frontier District.
Consequently

3. By this means the Officer in Charge will have complete control
in all civil and military matters under his command; a
reserve of training men will be available in a central
position for sudden requirements and for recruitments, refresher
and other can be selected and trained for their special
duties and their suitability for posts can be examined.

4. The 5th K.A.R. commanded by Lieut.-Colonel J. R. Hartley
has been administering both Northern and Southern Rhodesia
(the latter he took over and has been in command since) for the last
two years under the orders of the Provincial Commissioners and has
successfully and practically quelled their uprising. He
has prepared to take over the Battalion when ready to
be sent to and become the strength of the 3rd K.A.R.
to relieve the Northern garrison to the south from Bechuanaland.
The staff of civil, military, and police work require
reorganisation and the present staff of the 5th K.A.R. has
already received some training for this work.

5. I propose that the 3rd Battalion remain with its Headquarters
at Nelspruit. The 5th Battalion over its Headquarters to Nelspruit
when Rhodesia is handed over, and that one Battalion
should then be reduced to three Companies.

6. A senior man with administrative experience and a
knowledge of the Northern Frontier District and Transvaal will
be placed in command and I propose that the present
Commanding Officer, Lieut-Col. J. R. Hartley be appointed in
his present rank to command the large and elaborate
Battalion.

7. I have selected Nelspruit as being central
for all parts of the District; the gateway to the Northern
Frontier; in communication by road with Nelspruit, Louren-
ço Marques and Beira; in the headwaters of the motor
route; and, in addition, as being a healthy and
pleasant place for the staff to work or recuperate in.

10. For about 18 months from the incorporation of the new system, or until the military officer in command with their new duties, I propose that no Officer of superior rank remain at Marabout & the Senior Wajir and Gurraha take their offices would be given local military ranks.

11. In formulating the above proposals, there has been close touch with the Commandant A.R., who has submitted estimates giving the cost of garrisoning and administering the area in the system at £ 58,107 per annum. This proposal includes provision for necessary expenditure on administration work. The present cost of administration. The larger area is approximately £ 120,000. The 300th A.R. can, however, then be reduced by one Company, saving £ 9,000 in their Battalions Estimates and leaving the amount £ 46,507. I attach hereto the estimates submitted by the Commandant.

12. A platoon will be found of 50 men of the Roberts Army (and two British rangers) which is at present serving as part of the garrison in Turkana.

13. The medical service is not included in the returns. In addition to the two Indian Subalterns, the services of a Veterinary Officer will be available for economic reasons, as there are about 300 animals to supervise.

14. Certain necessary expenses for transfer of existing material have not been provided for in the attached estimates.

15. The existing civil and military establishment in the Northern Frontier District and Dabaland must be paid for during the first three months of the ensuing financial year so that these loops will only come in the estimates for about nine months, i.e. after the handing over is complete. But for the following year there should be a reduction in cost as the Geological Transport may be dispensed with and distances cut down when they may be found to be over-burdened or when expeditions are found to be generally unnecessary.

I am directed to ack. the receipt of your report of the 10th of January on the question of the future administration of the Northern Frontier District of the F.A.P., and to inform you that the proposals ~~made~~ ^{now} are approved generally.

2. It is assumed that you would not wish the proposed change to be effected until you yourself and the C.C. 5th V.I. Lieut. Colonel J. M. Llewellyn, return to E.A.

It is requested that when the change is about to be made, you will notify the S. of S. for the Colonies in order that the F.O. may be informed, and on your return to E.A., you will no doubt see the British Charge d'Affaires at Adis-Awaba informed direct as to the position generally, and the arrangements which are

being made.

4. It is not desired to make any comments in regard to the details of your proposals, except that it will be necessary for the Veterinary Officer, to whom you refer in para. 18 of your report, to be lent from the Veterinary Dept. of the E.A.P., for which it is hoped to secure an increased staff upon the general revision of E.African salaries.

5. As the present negotiations with Italy may be protracted, it is not advisable to fix in advance any date for the withdrawal of the 5th E.A.P. from Jubaland, or for the introduction of the new system of administration in the Northern Frontier District. In these circs. it is proposed, if you agree, to make telegraphic enquiry of the Cdt. of the E.A.P. as to the rationing of the troops now in Jubaland, as it seems probable that supplies for a limited time only may have been sent to Jubaland, in the belief that the country would be evacuated early in the year.
