## Bunyoro and Kampala-Luzira Port Railways.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 653/~~xxx~~<sup>xxv</sup> of the 9th instant on the above subject.

2. The statement of facts contained in Mr. Couper's letter enclosed therewith is quite clear, and I am of the opinion that these short railways in Uganda should be regarded as state-aided schemes for the development of Uganda. The acceptance of this view would remove the necessity for running them at a profit at present, a step which seems politically impossible.
3. The Railways should, I think, be removed entirely from the supervision of the General Manager, Uganda Railway, and should be worked by the Government of Uganda.
4. As Sir Robert Coryndon is now in England, I would suggest that a copy of Mr. Couper's letter and of my opinion be sent to him for his remarks.

- I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No S<sup>w</sup> 603/1920 of the 15th instant - on the above subject.  
2. The statement of facts contained in S.C. Circular letter enclosed therewith is quite clear and I am of the opinion that these short haulways in Uganda should be regarded as state-sided resources and the development of demands for acceptance of his view would render the security for running them at a profit impracticable, which seems politically impossible.
3. The haulways should, I think, be reserved entirely for the suppression of the General Maquis, Uganda having, and should be used by the Government of Uganda. As Sir Robert Longfellow is now in England, I would suggest that a copy of the Circular letter, and of my opinion be sent to him for his remarks.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No 603/1920 of January instant, and to assure you that the construction of the railway between the Capital and the northern frontier is progressing and I am of the opinion that this said railway in Uganda should be regarded as a short-sided railway for the development of agriculture. The appearance of this river would suggest the necessity for running farms on a profit at present in this country, particularly in the northern districts.

The railways through Uganda is now under consideration for the supervision of the General Manager. Uganda Railways and will be worked by the Government of Uganda. It is intended that a copy of the report after work of survey and to be sent to you for your remarks.
