Your Excellency: I received your letter dated the 31st Oct 19 in reply to Lord Mellners letter. Re: land. Examined to the late Pet. Uip by Colonel Wood Representative of his Majesty the King. With much regret ~~noted~~ his remarks as being unable to comply with the Committee's land.

I consider it unnecessary to repeat the contents of the promise. I must say in spite of the promise made by Colonel Wood at that time: have been placed in a heavy loss. The loss being due by buying the shares of the other share holders & owing to the confidence under which I have been labouring all the year. (The loss being the sum of £4000/-) At the same time I would like to point

Sir,

I have the honor to enclose  
a further letter from Mr. H. P. U. S.  
M. C. E. A. P. re his claim for land  
under a promise made by Sir Evelyn  
Wood 40 years ago. You have the  
precious papers. I am satisfied  
that Mr. U. S. is authorized to act  
and receive for his brother & sisters  
I am satisfied that the claim is  
genuine, and that the Government,  
though not legally bound, does  
morally owe Mr. U. S. a balance of  
land from unallotted soldiers'  
settlement, or other unalienated  
Crown land. I could without  
difficulty arrange, on my side,  
to satisfy this claim. Mr. U. S.  
is the Member of Legislative Council  
for the District of Columbia in the  
Asst. Secy. Palace, E. A. P.

he did undertake, and has  
talked before him, viz. the  
greatest assistance to the

in East Africa is very great,

As a matter of Policy & Strategy  
I recommend that the provisions
