South African Government's policy.



Your Lordship's letter dated 20th January 1919, in which you ask me to advise you what steps have been taken by the Government of the Gold Coast to secure the return of the Northern Frontier District relative to the grant of recognition to the Ikeresia emirate in the Anglo-Abyssinian operations during 1918.

As far as I am enabled to ascertain from the Department of State, the Northern Frontier District was not occupied by the British forces until the 1st of December last. The force sent for reconquest, however, consisted of the following, a total of 10,000 men:

The Anglo-Abyssinian Campaign 1919.

With the number to approach the British authorities,
I beg to recognize the Forces named in the
above paragraph.

Operations may be said to have commenced on
4th April 1919 with Lij Alemayu's raid on Beren village
in Moyale, and they continued until 13th September
when we completed the evacuation of Gaffi River.

Though our share of the Campaign was largely
irregular, I think we may safely say that our rôle in
driving raiders across the Frontier was not less
than for their wholesale surrender towards the
end of the Campaign.

Despite the difficulty of dealing in the open
with a well-armed enemy independent
of transport, we succeeded in killing between

The first big contact with the Tigre took place before the
battle of Dido Doyo, on the 3rd Encampment in the Northern
Tigre area. This movement was brought about by the Tigre
chiefs, on the night of the 4th-5th of April,
off to capture Dido Doyo, a British Dervish chief, and a

near Moyale, in the Moyale hills, and driven into
Moyale town 1500 yards from here (at the time there
were no British troops in their base) During the night 4th-5th

/5th with 1 section and a Lewis Gun accompanied by Mr. Bamber
informed the Constabulary who during the night had been observing

These patrols sat with the Kanyatta and were so far successful in that there were no raids.

Reference your No. 1344/V/101a dated 2nd
September 1919.

In para 1. of this office No. 209/1/5 of the
10th October 1919, Brigadier-General T. H. Blewitt, D.S.O.,
expressed the opinion that the operations must not be
allowed to be considered as of the nature of
a reconquest of East Africa. There was no indication
of the Afrikan General Service.

It will be observed that the Commandant
of the Frontier Force has been consulted by the Adjutant-General
of His Excellency's Guards. It is his opinion that
the action of the Afrikan General Service
is purely a military operation. P.C.

It is understood that the 3rd Battalion of the
Frontier Force will be sent to Nairobi
on or about 1st November 1919 to take over
from the 1st Battalion.

It is also understood that the 2nd Battalion of the
Frontier Force will be sent to Nairobi
on or about 1st November 1919 to take over
from the 2nd Battalion of the 50th Frontier Force.

In view of the above, it is recommended that
this will result in the discontinuation of the
Afrikan General Service. It is recommended that
