## POSITION ON ABYSSINIAN FRONTIER.

Recommends that H.O. be asked to inform Abyssinian Govt. that H.M. Govt. reserve right to reoccupy Gaddaduma at any time if necessary and that Boundary Commission should meet Abyssinian Representatives to fix Angle-Abyssinian boundary. Mr. Wittermaster and Mr. Hope shd be apptd on this commission. Proposes to issue instrns on return that patrols may pursue raiding bands across border.

Sir, I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your despatch No. 11370/1920 of 31<sup>st</sup> ult. on the subject of the Abyssinian Frontier.

2. I recommend that the Foreign Office be asked to inform the Abyssinian Government that His Majesty's Government must reserve to themselves the right to reoccupy Gaddadum at any time, should occasion require: indeed, at times, this is the only course open to us if we are to protect our tribesmen from the attacks of lawless bands of marauders, who act, if not with the direct connivance of the so-called Abyssinian Government Officials and troops, at any rate without any restraint from them.

3. It should once more be made clear to the Abyssinian Government that such actions on our part would never be necessary, if they on their part enforced law and order on the frontier.

4. The Baran trouble will never be settled until the Central Government at Addis Ababa can effectively control its subordinates on the Southern Borderland. But there is more even than this affecting the situation, in that a Boundary between Nations places the grazing ground of Nomadic African tribes on either side can never be satisfactory: Such tribes are indeed difficult enough to administer without dual control.

The Baran Refugees will never voluntarily, nor permanently, return to Abyssinian Territory without satisfactory safeguards; these cannot be obtained from a Government which exercises so little influence on its frontier Districts.

Compulsory repatriation of these natives would be a reversal of our policy, which, rightly or wrongly, for ten years past, has been to help and assist these wretched people and their cattle.

I believe the only solution is agreement on a frontier line which will either give us full control of the whole Bozan country, and occupation of all the wells they use: the descent of the Territory involved may fairly be demanded as compensation for the many acts of aggression and spoliation committed during the past few years by the Abyssinians and Tigre, for which the Government at Addis Ababa must be held responsible. 156

I recommend that the Foreign Office be asked to demand this, and that the same Boundary Commission which must be appointed soon, to demarcate the new Anglo-Italian Boundary should also meet Abyssinian Representatives to fix a new Anglo-Abyssinian Boundary Line, which will safeguard the interests of border tribes.

I suggest that both Mr. Kitchener and Mr. Hope be appointed to serve on such commission.

4. Meanwhile, unless Lord Milner wishes me to adopt a different policy, I propose, on my return to the Protectorate, to issue instructions, which will ensure, not only that our patrols will pursue marauding bands across the Border when hot on their heels, but that, at the discretion of the Officer on the spot, they may also pounce on offenders across the border who may have raided on our side but have crossed the border before detection: Such action would be a strong deterrent to raids.

5. I agree generally with the remarks made by the Acting Governor in Paras 9 to 12 of his despatch: I have already touched on most of these points. There is, and always has been, a general trend of native movement down East and Central Africa from the N.E., Southwards and Westwards: nomadic tribes, with camels, cattle, sheep, and goats, seeking new pastures: at present we are faced by a steady convergence towards West Kenya, viz. Turkana from the North-West, Bozan and Galla from the North, and Somalis from N.W. East - causing a confection onto <sup>Asia</sup> Nubia which must be stopped.
