Dear Sir Herbert

After the meeting of the Committee, when matters appeared to be settled, I was one of my staff on to going into the question of Rail Deliveries. It is only this afternoon that I am in a position to report to you.

I am able to obtain now a parcel of fine 75 lb. rails new, in France, - 13,000 tons @ about £14 per ton. I believe if a firm offer could be made for the whole parcel they could be purchased for £10/12, where they lie. I am also in a position to guarantee immediate shipment.

50 lbs., I think, is the weight specified for our Extension, but it just occurred to me that as the above rails are unquestionably cheap, and can be obtained now (for new orders you have to wait months and months) it might be good business to order them forthwith for the Uganda Railway for them to replace and give their partly worn rails for the Extension work.

This would give us rails when we wanted them and secondhand rails would cost our Extension much less, and consequently would materially help me to keep the cost low, and definitely might please everybody.
