1. Mr Anderson was instructed to proceed to England with Mr. B. Lewis of the Post Office, Nairobi, in accordance with the attached letter marked "A".
2. The Officers concerned left Nairobi on the 27th. January 1920, and proceeded to England via Bombay. It was impossible for them to observe the instruction contained in Paragraph 3 of the aforementioned letter, as it would have meant a delay of several months in Bombay before they could have caught an all sea route steamer. They actually left Bombay per the S.S. "Loyalty," bound for Marseilles only, on the 12th. February, and arrived at Marseilles on the 1st. March 1920. Mr Anderson was forced to travel 1st. Class as no 2nd. Class accommodation was available.
3. They were detained in Marseilles five days owing to the Railway Strike and arrived in London on the 7th. March.
4. The instructions contained in the attached letter marked "B" were strictly observed. The letter is returned for safe custody.
5. Mr Lewis reported with Mr Anderson at the Colonial Office on the 8th. March and the former was instructed to proceed with the latter to Lancashire in an endeavour to hand Mr Anderson over to his relations. The attached letter marked "C" with reference to the handling of Mr Anderson's Funds is also returned for safe custody.
6. Messrs Lewis and Anderson proceeded to Southport on the 9th. March, and Mr Lewis called

called on Mr Anderson's wife and mother-in-law, Mrs Bullough, at 34, Coudray Road, Hesketh Park, Southport, on the same evening. Mr Lewis was informed by these ladies that they were unwilling to effect any reconciliation with Mr Anderson, but subsequently they agreed to interview their Solicitor on the subject of helping him to make a fresh start in life.

7. On the 10th. March Mr Lewis called on these ladies again, and they expressed a desire that Mr Anderson should call on their Solicitor with Mr Lewis to discuss matters. Mr Anderson did not agree to this proposal and asked Mr Lewis to do all he could to arrange a direct meeting between his wife and himself.


8. Mr Lewis again saw the ladies on the 11th March, and a meeting between Mr Anderson and his wife was arranged for the same evening.

9. This meeting led to an understanding that on the following day, both his wife and Mrs Bullough, would meet Mr Anderson in order to come to some settlement.

10. On the 12th. inst. an arrangement was effected under which Mr Anderson was to proceed to a Farm in the south of England so that he might regain his health and faculties. The expense involved would, it is understood, be borne on Mr Anderson's personal funds and if necessary, subsequently by Mrs Bullough.

11. Normally Mr Lewis should have returned to London on the 13th. March, but he proceeded to Yorkshire on private business and understands that his connection with the case terminates on and from that date. (See copy of wire to Colonial Office marked "D".)

12. Since Mr Lewis left East Africa with Mr Anderson he has had charge of the latter's accounts. Evidence to prove that these are in order is contained in the attached memorandum signed by Mr Anderson marked "E".

In regard to the transfer of above mentioned inmate to England I beg to recommend the following conditions for his journey and trust you will be able to give effect to them as they are essential to the well-being of the patient :-

- (1) That a compartment be reserved for Mr Anderson and Mr Lewis of the Post Office Audit who is accompanying him to Mombasa.
- (2) That room be reserved in the European Hospital, Mombasa or, failing that, in the Native Hospital, if it is necessary for Mr. Anderson to spend a night at Mombasa.
- (3) That Mr Anderson travel by an all sea route from Bombay to London.

The bearer, Mr. B. Lewis, Assistant Chief Accountant, General Post Office of this Protectorate has under his charge Mr. E. H. Anderson who is returning home on the advice of the Medical Authorities.

They are of the opinion that Mr. Anderson who has lately been released from the Asylum, is fit to travel and will not need a regular attendant on the voyage, but that he should be under the supervision of a friend. They state that steps as are possible should be taken to prevent his having access to alcohol during the voyage, in order to prevent any repetition of the trouble from which he has been suffering.

You have handed me papers from the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate in the case of Mr. E. H. Anderson.

I understand that he is certified as able to transact his own affairs, but that you are anxious that he should have the benefit of your assistance until you can place him in charge of his relatives.

I also understand that he has funds on which he can draw and that, so far, he has been willing to hand the money as required, to you to spend on his account.

It will clearly be to his advantage that this arrangement should last till you can hand him over to his friends, you keeping an account of the money as hitherto, but you are aware that this can only continue so long as he is willing, and my purpose in giving you this memorandum is merely that you should have something in writing as to your position in case you experience any trouble in the matter.
