Colonial official of limited means who is being treated in the London Hospital, where they are now making, I believe, a charge for all in-patient treatment? We could not fairly do so. It would be impossible to argue that, because we have not entered into a definite arrangement with the London Hospital, we cannot recognise the man's being there. Another point is under what circumstances should we want to put a man into the Albert Dock Hospital? I cannot imagine that any but a very very small proportion of Colonial officials arrive now-a-days by sea in or near the Albert Dock and to send a man to the Albert Dock in the same way as to Hilary Bay. The Seamen's Hospital at Greenwich is, of course, far more convenient and has often been extremely useful.

I do not believe that the privilege of residing during convalescence after illness at Osborne was ever taken advantage of by any officer of the Naval Service. I have forgotten indeed, I have ever finally secured the privilege for the Naval Service. It is the thing to be treated in a hospital and another thing to go to a convalescent one.

Under the latter plan we might not always get ~~forwards~~ full value for our money, but the likelihood is always so anxious to help that I am not uneasy on that score. We might not use full value, or in that case the number of beds supported would be revised in the light of experience.

Dear Sir Herbert Read,

Your letter of the 6th May in regard to providing Hospital accommodation for Officers in the East and West African Service, home on leave, has now been considered. The point you raise has no direct reference to the London School of Tropical Medicine. It is really a matter for the Board of Management of the Seamen's Hospital Society.

I am directed to inform you that the Board favourably view the suggestion made in your letter. They are glad to hear that the Governments of East and West Africa would be willing to contribute a sufficient sum to maintain a certain number of beds and it might be possible that these beds should be provided in the various Hospitals of this Society. The Hospital for Tropical Diseases, to which the London School of Tropical Medicine is attached, is preserved solely for persons suffering from Tropical Disease, but it is considered your communication refers to other cases which might be better treated in a Hospital such as this at Greenwich, or at the Albert Dock.

In these circumstances it may be worth your while to consider whether it would not be preferable to arrange for the accommodation of a certain number of patients rather than the maintenance of a definite ward.

The cost of maintaining a patient in a General Hospital at the present time averages over £3. per bed per week, or between £150 and £160 per annum. Unfortunately with the higher prices this cost per bed is increasing.

It will afford me pleasure to go further into this matter - it is the desire of the Board to meet your wishes in this respect in every way in their power.
