However desirable in theory the co-ordination of the ~~of the~~ trigonometrical work may be I doubt if the matter is of sufficient practical urgency to justify heavy expenditure at a time when we are in difficulties as to finance.

The boundaries of the East African Protectorate and Uganda with neighbouring countries lie entirely in regions which either supply a natural frontier or are most unlikely to be the subject of European development. The cadastral surveys of all the Protectorate are therefore self-contained and it does not concern anyone whether the nearest points of approach between cadastral groups are 20 or 20 ~~or 20~~ miles. I should be sorry to have to press this on the Government so far as Uganda or Tanganyika territory is concerned.

I suggest that in the first instance these papers to Sir S. Northey and Sir R. Cameron, with a copy of this minute, and arrange a discussion of them here. When we have their views on the matter up till the summer, when Major Kempthorne is on leave and we can discuss the matter in Committee.
