I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your telegram No. 100 of the 19th February, from which I regret to learn that owing to the present financial emergency it is proposed to increase the annual contribution to the Imperial Bureau of Mycology for the coming financial year, beyond £100.

2. There is no need for me to enlarge on the importance of the work performed by the Bureau of Mycology, and the value ~~of that work~~ to Kenya. The increase in the ~~contribution~~ from the Colonies and Protectorates will fully and amply sufficient to provide the Bureau on a proper footing, and if Kenya does not make its full contribution, the Treasury will be bound to require the proposed contributions from Uganda and ~~Kenya~~ to be correspondingly reduced, if not entirely stopped.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your telegram No. 100 of the 19th February, from which I regret to learn that owing to the present financial stringency it is not proposed to increase the annual contribution to the Imperial Bureau of Mycology, for the coming financial year, beyond £100.

2. There is no need for me to enlarge on the importance of the work performed by the Bureau of Mycology, and its value to Kenya. The increased contributions requested from the Colonies and Protectorates generally will be barely sufficient to place the Bureau on a proper footing, and if Kenya does not make its full contribution, the Treasury will no doubt require the proposed contributions from Uganda and Nyasaland to be correspondingly reduced. I earnestly hope, therefore, that it will be possible to include in the Estimate the sum of £250 as originally requested.
