SIR,

With reference to Lord Milner's despatch No. 1769 of 4th December, I have the honour to suggest that the following alterations and additions should be made in the pamphlet enclosed therewith, relating to appointments for Nursing Sisters in East Africa:

Paragraph 3. It is at present considered advisable that applicants for posts should be qualified in midwifery.

Paragraph 5. The salary of Nursing Sisters is £200 by £15 to £250 per annum calculated from the date of 1st appointment.

The Senior Nursing Sister, Mombasa Hospital, receives an allowance of £20 per annum. Free quarters are provided for Nursing Sisters.

Paragraph 6. In the case of it being necessary for a Nursing Sister to travel to this Country via South Africa, a detention allowance of sh.15/- per diem for any period

period during which she may have to wait at Durban for a ship, is payable to her.

Nursing Sisters are entitled to travelling allowance at the rate of four shillings per night when travelling on duty away from their permanent stations.

2. I enclose a memorandum dealing with local conditions, including particulars of the uniform with which Nursing Sisters are required to supply themselves.

1. The Nursing Staff of the Kenya Colony numbers one Matron and 27 Nursing Sisters.
2. European Hospitals to which Nursing Sisters are attached are in existence at
  - (1) Mombasa
  - (2) Nairobi
  - (3) Eldoret
  - (4) Kisumu

Every Nursing Sister is in charge of a ward at the Native Hospital Mombasa and it is proposed to extend this system to the other three Native Hospitals throughout the Colony. The staffs of the Health Office at Mombasa and Nairobi include a nursing sister. Infant welfare centres are being started and run very largely by the Health Office Nursing Sisters.

3. It must be understood that no guarantee can be given as to where a nursing sister will be stationed on her first arrival in the country nor return from leave.

Free furnished quarters and light are provided but only partial service and it is the custom for the nursing sisters to employ their own boy, lessing and washing are not provided. The furniture provided does not include bed linen.

4. Nursing sisters while on duty are required to wear the recognised uniform no. When off duty plain clothes are allowed.

The following are the articles of uniform with which nursing sisters are required to provide themselves:

- 1 white, one piece, dress of Oxford shirting pique drill or Gaberdine, with sailor band on neck and soft turn-over collar and cuffs either to match uniform or of macin.
- 6 caps, Indian Army.
- white stockings.
- white canvas shoes.
- 1 sun helmet.
- 12 linen pyjamas
- 6 waist belts (white)
- 1 pair mosquito boots.
- Shoes should have rubber heel pads.

In addition to the above uniform it is advisable for nursing sisters to provide themselves with general equipment as follows:-

- 1 sun umbrella
- Umbrella Mackintosh
- Travelling Rug.
- Tweed coat & skirt or woollen dress.
- Woollen jumper.

3. While a nursing sister is in charge of arrangements at the Native Hospital Mission, she is responsible to the Head Nurse of the Colony. In addition there are dispensaries throughout the Colony. The staffs of the Health Office of Nairobi and Mombasa include a nursing sister. Infant welfare centres are being started and run very largely by the Health Office Nursing Sisters.
4. It must be understood that no guarantee can be given as to where a nursing sister will be stationed upon her first arrival in the country or return from leave.
5. Free furnished quarters and light are provided but only partial service and it is the custom for the nursing sisters to look after their own cooking and washing and are not provided. The furniture provided does not include bed linen.
6. Nursing sisters while on duty are required to wear the recommended uniform but when off duty plain dresses are allowed.
7. The following is the suggested uniform with which nursing sisters are required to serve themselves:-

10 white, one piece dresses of cord and chintz pique  
Gmail or Gaberdine, with shirt band on neck and not  
turnover collar and cuffs either to match uniform or  
of muslin.  
4 caps, Indian Army.  
White stockings.  
White canvas shorts.  
1 sun helmet.  
12 linen frocks  
4 waist belts (white)  
1 pair mosquito boots.  
Shoes should have rubber heel pads.

In addition to the above uniform it is advisable for nursing sisters to provide themselves with general equipment as follows:-

- 1 sun umbrella
- Umbrella pocketbook
- Traveling rug
- Faded out a skirt or woollen dress.
- Woollen jumper.
